The Navy and Air Force EWOs here are doing a great job of banging away at the threat and their changes in tactics are demonstrating the successes. The Army is supposed to assume the land-locked electronic warfare mission by the end of next year. Their capabilities in that area had been allowed to atrophy back about the time of the first Gulf War. They didn't see any need in that area due to the demise of the Soviets and the lack of technology in the rest of the world. But they have rethought that and, in my 'other' guise of an Army master sergeant, I may actually get to contribute to that effort as well. I am supposed to get an additional skill identifier for electronic warfare out of this tour. Then the Army can bring me back for a final hurrah in uniform.
