I'm back from my 15th mission trip to Cambodia (25th overall). Great trip with sunny, 85 - 90 degree weather every day. Attached is another photo of the '71 Class Plaque on the wall at the American *'FreeBird'* bar and grill, as well as a couple of photos of one of my patients. This 2 1/2 year old, 7 kilogram, boy was discovered to have a significant heart murmur at a Province orphanage. A medical 'work up' diagnosed him as having a VSD (Ventricular Septal Defect) i.e., a malformation resulting in a 'hole' between the two main pumping chambers of the heart. I helped provide the anesthesia for Cambodian surgeons to perform open heart surgery to repair his defect. Without the surgery, this young boy would have died of heart failure at about age 5 or 6. This kid was so stoic that I never heard him cry or even whimper, from the morning we brought him into the O.R. until he was discharged from the Surgical Intensive Care Unit a few days later. The morning after his surgery, the nurses took a photo of us while he was still sleeping. He awoke and the nurses took a second photo. Even at age 2 1/2, this kid projected a

certain 'Gravitas.' As Leonard Nimoy's '*Mr. Spock*' would put it, I'm certain this kid will 'Live long and Prosper.' Jim." Wow! You do good work, Doctor! Our class is blessed by you!
