Next is a news release from the University of Arizona on March 29<sup>th</sup>: "Richard Fisher, president and chief executive officer of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, will speak at the University of Arizona about the nation's financial situation. Fisher's lecture, 'Where We Go From Here: The Crisis and Beyond,' is part of the UA Eller College of Management Distinguished Speaker Series. Fisher previously served as vice chairman of Kissinger McLarty Associates, a strategic advisory firm chaired by former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger. He began his career in 1975 at the private bank of Brown Brothers Harriman and Co. where he specialized in fixed income and foreign exchange markets. Fisher became Assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury during the Carter administration, working on issues related to the dollar crisis of 1978-79. He then returned to Brown Brothers to found its Texas operations in Dallas.

"In 1987, he created Fisher Capital Management and a separate fundsmanagement firm, Fisher Ewing Partners. From 1997 to 2001, Fisher was deputy U.S. trade representative with the rank of ambassador and over-saw the implementation of NAFTA and various agreements with Vietnam, Korea, Japan, Chile and Singapore. He was a senior member of the team that negotiated the bilateral accords for China's and Taiwan's accession to the World Trade Organization.

"Throughout his career, Fisher has served on numerous for-profit and notfor-profit boards. He has also maintained his academic interests, teaching graduate courses and serving on several university boards. He was a Weatherhead Fellow at Harvard in 2001, is an honorary fellow of Hertford College at Oxford University and is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

"A first-generation American, Fisher is equally fluent in Spanish and English, having spent his formative years in Mexico. He attended the U.S. Naval Academy from 1967 to 1969 and graduated with honors from Harvard University in economics in 1971. He read Latin American politics at Oxford from 1972 to 1973 and received a master of Business Administration from Stanford University in 1975.

"In October 2006, Fisher received the Service to Democracy Award and Dwight D. Eisenhower Medal for Public Service from the American Assembly. In April 2009, he was inducted into the Dallas Business Hall of Fame." That's a great career for our classmate. I think we need Richard to give us a brief on how our nation will avoid a huge financial crisis with this ever increasing debt load! Keep up the great work Richard!

Too soon it is time to close. I hope your spring was a "best ever!" Our next reunion is a month, so be ready to make reservations.
