Nice note from my fellow Missourian, **Mike Gaffney**: "Duke, last month, after I retired from the commercial nuclear industry after 15 years and 26 years of the Navy, Martha and I embarked on our first adventure using the great privilege of Space A travel

with the Air Mobility Command. We traveled from Norfolk to Lemoore, Ca, visited my daughter, Maria in San Francisco, and then returned from Travis AFB in a C-17. It was a great adventure and we look forward to our next Space A trip." Sounds like you and Martha will have a fun retirement! I look forward to your visits to the Beach!

I received this note from Perry Martini: "It is my sad duty to report the loss of our dear friend and classmate, **Bob Beckman** who died suddenly at his home in Arlington, Virginia. Although the official cause of death has not yet been determined it is suspected that he died of a heart attack.

"Bob grew up in Ashtabula, Ohio, an only child raised by his mother after his father died suddenly as a young boy. Bob excelled in sports, especially football, where he played halfback and defensive back. Academically, he was a National Merit Scholar, and was elected and served as the president of his student council his senior year.

"Bob had multiple college scholarship options, but chose to come to Annapolis as a principal appointee of his Congressman. At USNA, Bob was the extrovert's extrovert, never without multiple jokes or stories to tell. Athletically, he rowed crew plebe year and played intramural sports such as company football and field ball. An Economics major, he managed to win an Immediate Graduate Education Program (IGEP) scholarship to the Naval Postgraduate School (NPS), Monterey and completed a master's degree in less than one year at NPS prior to sea duty. Some of Bob's fondest memories after graduation and NPS (and the sources of most of his "top ten" sea stories) involved his service as a junior combat systems officer in USS TOWERS (DDG 9); and (after transferring to Supply Corps) as the Supply Dept Head in USS KINKAID (DD 965). Both ships were homeported in San Diego and both deployed to the Western Pacific. TOWERS had "gun line" duty during the Vietnam War.

"After sea duty Bob served in the Pentagon in Washington, DC and despite his deep selection to LCDR, he decided to leave active duty for a position with Lockheed Martin. Bob's Lockheed tenure saw him rise quickly to vice president, in charge of a geographic region in the company's emerging information technology business. But this wasn't enough challenge, either, so after several years he struck out on his own and began a management consulting practice, 'In Perspective, LLC', which he successfully operated until the time of his death.

"A truly outstanding classmate and a proud member of 25th Company, shipmate, officer, gentleman and husband, he is survived by his wife of 29 years, Jan Fleming. Their 30th wedding anniversary would have been on September 21st. Bob was 63."

Regretfully, I received another note from Perry: "It is my sad duty to report the unexpected passing of our dear friend and classmate, **Frank Edgerton**, who recently died while hiking with his family and friends in Moab, Utah. Although it was not

determined as to cause of death it was suspected to be a heart attack. Born and raised in Red Springs, North Carolina, Frank graduated from the 28th company and was currently living in Albany, California. Condolences can be sent to his widow, Anothia, at 555 Pierce St, Gateway 609, Albany, CA 94706. A 'Celebration of Life' was held for Frank in Albany. A burial of his ashes will take place in Red Springs, NC."

Too soon it's time to close. Life is short, so love with all your heart, give generously to those whom you love, and speak words of peace and life to all. Please keep our classmates and their families in your prayers for good health and safety in summer travels. Pray, too, that our mission in Afghanistan will achieve success and our work in Iraq does produce an ally in the Middle East. We have several classmates in business and government leadership who can use our thoughts and prayers, too. There is plenty of work remaining for us as we increase our wisdom!
