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

Mustached Mids?

For a few weeks in November (post-ESPN filming and pre-Thanksgiving), midshipmen were allowed to sport mustaches (or at least attempt to) in support of Movember, a campaign to raise awareness about men's health issues. While many noted that this was the first time midshipmen were allowed to grow hair above their lips, it's not quite true, but it has been a very long time. In fact, *Shipmate* uncovered this image from 1872. However, this is the first time midshipmen have forgone shaving in the name of men's health and the Movember movement. The mustaches, of course, were required to meet Navy regulations on facial hair—no more than a quarter-inch away from the corner of the mouth, no touching the top of the lip and no growth down the side of the mouth. Midshipman Johnathan Hurd '14 of the 29th Company was the champion mustachegrower in the Brigade, but he still didn't hold a razor to the Academy's mustached-leader, Vice Admiral Michael H. Miller.

THE PARTICULARS ON PEROT

The September-October 2013 issue features the article "Perot: A Pioneer and a Patriot" which gives well-deserved recognition to the achievements of Mr. Perot. However, the author of the article evidently misunderstood Mr. Perot's

reference to his role in the development of the Honor Concept.

I refer you to Vice Admiral William P. Lawrence's autobiography, "Tennessee Patriot," in which he gives a detailed description of the development of the Honor Concept (pages 16–22), beginning with the discussions among the several class leaders in the 1949–50 academic year concerning the "dope system," and ending with the implementation of the concept in academic year 1951–52. The latter was the trial-and-error phase in the development of procedures for the implementation of the concept, and provided the material for Mr. Perot to then, in his senior year, draw up the formal procedures as requested of him by the new superintendent, Vice Admiral Joy [Class of 1916].

Unfortunately, the article's author leaves the reader with the impression that it was not until Vice Admiral Joy made his request to Mr. Perot that the Honor Concept was developed. Inasmuch as the history of the Concept's development is an important part of the history of the Naval Academy, I have felt the need to bring this to your attention.

The article featuring Ross Perot mentions his appointment to develop an honor system at the Academy. In the spring of 1953, Ross was president of the Brigade Honor Committee while I was the plebe representative—one of the very few brigade positions for a plebe. I was elected because I was a former Marine and knew many classmates from NAPS. I was a Korean War vet. Wounds had healed, but I was having severe troubles with trench foot and had some surgery on both feet midwinter of 1952–53.

I visited Ross's room during study hours every week or two for brief discussions about honor matters. We strayed briefly into personal backgrounds on occasion, especially since both of us came from austere country backgrounds.

On a visit to Ross's room during the "Dark Ages" about February of '53, I was really feeling down and I commented to Ross as best I can recall, "I've been thru Paris Island; I've been to Korea; this plebe summer and plebe year are just more endless crap, and my feet are hurting like hell—and there's lots more to come. I think I'm gonna put in my papers and get the h--- out of here!" After a few moments of deafening silence, Ross calmly looked straight at me and asked, "And just what are you going to

tell your Mom when you walk in the kitchen door?" With no further discussion of that subject, we went on and finished honor system business of the evening.

In retrospect, looking back at successful careers in both the military and civilian worlds, that simple question from Ross, with not one more word of discussion, rhetoric, cajoling, etc., was unquestionably the best ever "career guidance" I ever received.



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NAVY'S "COACH" GREEN

In his first season as the varsity football military liaison, Major Robert B. Green '98, USMC, worked alongside Coach Ken Niumatalolo and the military officer representatives to mentor Navy football players to assume future positions of leadership in the Navy and Marine Corps. Part of Green's job is to make sure players are aware of their military responsibilities. He advises them of upcoming inspections and how to prepare for road trips. Green has much to share from his own personal experiences. He grew up in Atlanta, GA, and attended Booker T. Washington High School. After graduation, he was among 70 football recruits sent to the Naval Academy Prep School in Newport, RI, by former Navy Coach George Chaump (1990-94).

Green arrived at the Naval Academy in 1993 and played as the starting cornerback. He was named an All-Independent selection and played in the Blue-Grey All-Star Classic in his first class year. While he performed well on the playing field, he did not do as well academically which required him to spend another year at the Academy. He graduated in 1998 with a major in English and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps.

Major Green served three tours of duty in Afghanistan and Iran, and has been awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Meritorious Service Medal and Defense Meritorious Service Medal.

In a recent interview, he noted that the most important aspect of mentoring is to have the midshipmen understand what the Naval Academy really means to their military careers, and that how they perform on the football field makes them better leaders.

DAVID ROBINSON'S SKYPE VISIT TO MIDDLESEX COMMUNITY COLLEGE

At the center of teacher Sean Coughlin '87's English Composition I course at Middlesex Community College in Bedford, MA, is abolitionist, writer and former slave Frederick Douglass. While enslaved, Douglass taught himself to read and write when, if discovered, the penalty was death. This fall, when Coughlin was searching for a way to inspire and uplift his students to find their own voices as Douglass had done, he reached out to his classmate and friend, David Robinson '87.


David Robinson, widely considered to be the best basketball player in Naval Academy history, spoke to Coughlin's students via Skype about freedom and human dignity for all people, things Douglass pursued his entire life. Struck by Robinson's "grace and godliness" Coughlin's students asked questions about Robinson's basketball career and listened intently as he encouraged them to be just as great in their own lives, described Coughlin.

When Robinson spoke about leadership he conveyed the importance of "seeking a calling and not just a job" and acting as an example to others in times of need. He also urged the students to be a part of the solution and not the statistic of the "altogether too many young people of color incarcerated in American prisons."

Coughlin's students were "thoroughly inspired by David" and left the classroom hopeful and contemplative about their futures. Coughlin hopes Robinson's Skype

session will lead each of them to be leaders and righteous examples no matter where their individual paths may take them.

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
Utgoff, a retired Naval aviator and captain, was a professor in the department in the 1970s and 1980s.

The Utgoff Fund also supported Midshipman Sipe's and two fellow midshipmen's participation in the Small Satellite Conference in Logan, UT, in August 2013. Attended by more than 1,000 small satellite technologists from around the world, the conference offered an opportunity for Midshipman Sipe to present his poster project on a UNIX Space Server—an open source web server in space.

DragonSat, the first of four midshipman-built CubeSat spacecraft built in collaboration with students from Drexel University, launched from Wallops Island, MD, in November aboard a Minotaur I launch vehicle. Three additional CubeSat spacecraft are in various stages of design and will form the foundation for Aerospace Engineering major participation in technical conferences for several years.

The Utgoff Fund and other support from alumni and friends will play a critical role in the development of these projects and their presentation at technical conferences across the country and around the world.

FORMER FOOTBALL PLAYERS FLY PRESIDENT

The next time President Obama arrives by helicopter to a meeting or ceremonial event, a former Navy football player may be at the controls. As a recent article in the Annapolis *Capital* reported, four one-time members of the team currently serve as pilots for Marine Helicopter Squadron One (HMX-I), responsible for transporting the president, vice president, cabinet members and other officials.

The pilots, Captain Steve Adair '04, USMC, a defensive end; Major Rocky Checca '02, USMC, a linebacker; Captain Adam Horne '05, USMC, a defensive end; and Captain Chandler Sims '04, USMC, a wide receiver, were selected based on their performance and competency, commendations and recommendations and a security screening process designed to vet individuals who are frequently in close proximity to the president.

Their years at the Academy, and in particular their time on the football team, helped prepare the four for their current responsibilities.

"What Navy football did for us is gave us the drive and determination and ability to get the job done," Captain Adair, who has served three deployments to Afghanistan and Africa, told the *Capital*. "The hardest thing I've ever done mentally or physically is Coach [Paul] Johnson's fourth quarters. Getting up at 4 a.m. to go work out for an hour in the cold and rain really developed toughness. Those experiences enabled us to perform at a high level and not get stressed out, which are the exact qualities you need in this job."

ESPN LIVE FROM USNA

The Naval Academy hosted ESPN on Friday, 8 November for the network's annual SportsCenter Veterans Day broadcast tribute. The program included pre-recorded features of midshipmen, live interviews with USNA leaders and



broadcasts of noon meal formation. Airing from 9 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., the programming included two live broadcasts every hour from the Academy.

Set in T-Court and anchored by Hannah Storm and Kevin Negandhi, the national broadcast provided a great opportunity for the Academy to showcase to the American public the importance of its mission and the excellence of the Brigade, faculty and staff.

Alumni Involvement in Operation Damayan

The most powerful storm to make landfall in 2013 struck the Philippines on 8 November, killing more than 6,000 people and displacing 4.4 million more while also destroying crops and infrastructure estimated in the hundreds of millions of dollars. At the peak of the rescue and recovery effort, the U.S. had more than 50 ships and aircraft in the disaster zone. By late November, the military had started to reduce its presence to allow for civilian aid agencies.

"We were inbound to approach into Manila ... we heard a mayday call from a helicopter that just crashed into Manila Bay," said Major Jason Kauffinan '99, USMC. "We set up in orbit, we got eyes on the survivors, there were two of them in the water."

The crew immediately prepared to deploy a life raft.

On 24 November, a KC-130J Super Hercules assigned to the squadron was returning to Villamor Air Base from

Tacloban after delivering relief supplies in support of Operation Damayan, the U.S. military response to Typhoon Haiyan, when they heard the mayday call, approximately 18 nautical miles northwest of North Harbor.

Representatives with the U.S. Agency for International Development, returning from Tacloban to help with relief efforts, were passengers in the KC-130J.

"[Operation Damayan] has been a textbook example—it's a model, of what we can do when we all work together," said Jeremy Konyndyk, a USAID representative and passenger aboard the

Super Hercules. "It's always nice to learn from what's gone right."


Also aboard the aircraft were congressmen Trent Franks (AZ), Chris Smith (NJ) and Al Green (TX), who traveled to the Philippines to observe the relief and recovery efforts of the U.S. military.

"In an absolutely amazing example of military precision, (the crew) dropped a life raft to where the people could swim to it," said Franks. "It seems like (Kauffman's) call sign 'Rescue' was emphasized again. I believe that the military (members) of the U.S. are the most noble figures in human society."



A Personal Connection

Philippine navy Commander Vincent Sibala '93, commanding officer of the Tomas Batilo-class fast-attack craft BRP BONNY SERRANO (PG-111), embarked on the U.S. Navy's forward-deployed aircraft carrier GEORGE WASHINGTON (CVN 73) to serve as a liaison officer between Philippine and U.S. naval forces in support of Operation Damayan last November.

"[BRP BONNY SERRANO] took shelter near the village of Cebu when the typhoon struck, and I was selected as a liaison after we learned of the George Washington Strike Group coming to help with the relief efforts," said Sibala. "It's important to have communication between Philippine naval forces ashore and the strike group to direct the relief efforts and provide supplies to the villages that need it most."

After spending one year at the Philippine Military Academy, Sibala attended the U.S. Naval Academy and graduated in 1993



with a degree in oceanography. His prior navy experience would come into play in the aftermath of Super Typhoon Haiyan.

The village of Tacloban's central location and air field made it one of the key areas to stage relief supplies to deliver to many of the affected areas.

"We maintain an open line of communication with Tacloban and get daily briefs on which areas have been serviced with food and water and which areas still need help," said Sibala. "What we're trying to avoid right now is the duplication of efforts from the local government and the ship. But more importantly, we need to ensure there are no gaps in the delivery of relief supplies and cover as many affected areas as possible."

Sibala also gained the opportunity to work with a former Academy classmate and friend, Commander Eric Lindfors, currently the surface operations officer for Commander, Task Force 70, embarked on board GEORGE WASHINGTON.

"It was great to see Vince [Sibala] again. The last time I saw him was at graduation 20 years ago," said Lindfors. "The relief effort really became personal for me after he told me that he had grown up in Tacloban and much of his family still lives in the area. We always say the world is a small place as we graduate and head off on our careers, but the unique bond of being Naval Academy classmates allows us to work together through difficult situations such as this. It's always rewarding to work together with our partner nations, having it be a classmate makes it that much more."

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A Crisis of Character

"3-Star Navy Admiral, Fired As No. 2 Commander of U.S. Nuclear Forces"

"Navy Secrets Bought with Prostitutes"

"Pilot Charged with Being Web Predator"

The growing list of headlines and news stories including tales of corruption, unethical and embarrassing behavior, and even illegal activity seems more appropriate for television dramas than Naval Academy graduates. These stories make the news because they are indeed rare, but the coverage last fall seemed particularly cringeworthy. For an institution committed to producing ethical leaders to serve the nation, the less-than-flattering coverage of a few of its alumni sparked

animated conversations among the alumni population.

Shipmate discussed ethics and leadership at the Naval Academy and beyond with three leaders: Captain Rick Rubel '72, USN (Ret.), distinguished military professor of ethics; Colonel Arthur "Art" J. Athens '78, USMC (Ret.), director for the Stockdale Center for Ethical Leadership; and Rear Admiral Walter E. "Ted" Carter Jr. '81, USN, president of the Naval War College.

Teachable Moments

At the heart of the U.S. Naval Academy's mission is the moral, mental and physical development of midshipmen. With demanding courses taught by top professors and frequent physical fitness tests, the mental and physical training of midshipmen is obvious but their moral development process is less apparent to the outside eye. All three

characteristics are essential to producing future leaders and Captain Rick Rubel '72, USN (Ret.), has made it his own personal mission to ensure that the moral development of those commissioned each May is as extensive as possible.

Rubel is the coordinator of the U.S. Naval Academy Core Ethics Course, was appointed by the Superintendent as the first Distinguished Military Professor of Ethics and is the occupant of "The General Robert T. Herres, Distinguished Military Professorship Chair of Leadership and Ethics." He also recently co-authored and co-edited a book focusing on ethics in the Military titled, "Case Studies in Military Ethics."

From Rubel's perspective, moral development encompasses two basic, yet complex, questions—'what' and 'why'? Rubel stated, "The 'what' pertains to training and instruction. The midshipmen are told what to do and what not to do. The 'why' though is the most important question to me and it's what I focus on in my Ethics courses. Why do we make the decisions that we do?"

Rubel asks midshipmen to delve deeply into the "why" behind all of their decisions, good or bad, as doing so provides them with an opportunity to explore their own morality and expose their character's strengths and flaws.

"To do the right thing requires two things—you have to have the morals to know right from wrong, and you have to have all of the virtues of character to actually do what's right. I think what happens to most of us is that we know what is wrong but we do wrong anyway and the reason is usually because one of our virtues of character lets us down. For example, if an individual is lacking in a virtue such as courage, self-control or patience, it can lead to poor decision making. I want students to stop, think and understand why they make moral decisions. I have them look at case studies, choose a course of action and explain why they chose option A or B. Asking yourself 'why' is the beginning of understanding your own morals and improving upon them."

One of the more tangible tools Rubel uses to expose his students to their own character is an actual "character map," developed by Rubel himself. Midshipmen are asked to map their character and choose several virtues they want to work on. The character map is used at the Academy during all four years, including the first class capstone. "I want the midshipmen to think about their own character as a leader and how they can work on it, as well as developing the character of our sailors and Marines—that's our job."

When asked how he reacts to the negative media stories regarding Academy graduates Rubel responded, "Again, I look at the why. We're not all perfect. We all make mistakes. However, I can't make excuses for it. We are in the spotlight, and we should be in the spotlight. The press keeps us honest and when we do the wrong thing we should be exposed."

Rubel hopes that by focusing on character at the Academy and providing tools such as the character map, midshipmen will be fully aware of their own character flaws before entering the fleet so that they can improve upon them and avoid such negative headlines. "We can always get better. Understanding our weaknesses and working continuously to improve ourselves ensures that we are the best officers and people we can be."

The Formative Years

"I think we should have a higher expectation for our graduates," said Colonel Art Athens '78, USMCR (Ret.), director of the Vice Admiral James B. Stockdale Center for Ethical Leadership. "They should be the standard bearers as they go out in the fleet."

Established in 1998, the Stockdale Center promotes and enhances the ethical development of current and future military leaders. Focusing on excellence in ethical leadership through research, consultation, innovation and dissemination of information, the Center employs diverse tools to reach a diverse brigade and a diverse Navy. Programs provided by the Center are enabled and enhanced through private gift funding via the Naval Academy Foundation.

The legacy of Admiral Stockdale not only guides the work of the Center, but serves as a motivating factor, explained Athens. "We have this legacy that goes with everything that we

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do, and we want to represent him extremely well. And not just while we're here in the office, but everywhere we go."

The annual McCain Conference, the culmination of a year-long research effort, brings together research fellows who have been in residence at the Academy, midshipmen, ethics and leadership faculty from the nation's military undergraduate and graduate educational institutions, representatives from industry and thought leaders from prestigious universities in the United States, Europe and Asia. Ethics curricula may be developed from the intensive research accomplished by the resident fellows and insights gained from the conference.

"When we did the research on unmanned aerial vehicles, UAVs, and the more common term, drones, there were things that came out of that research that ended up in our core ethics course," said Athens. "That's the kind of interaction that occurs on the research end."

Outcomes from all of the programs benefit midshipmen. In their consulting and facilitation role, the Center staff presents to external groups like the Navy's Senior Enlisted Academy, Marine Corps' Expeditionary Warfare School, FBI, Drug Enforcement Agency, Department of Energy, among others, gaining additional perspective and employing new techniques which are brought back to the Academy.

And techniques change with each class, and each midshipman.

"The principles of ethical leadership development have remained the same, but how they need to be delivered to the new generation is very different," said Athens. "There is the close battle, to use a military analogy, but we are trying to look at what's down the road, over the horizon."

Innovation in ethics training is key as one program or approach may work with some, but not others. The Center produced six ethical decision-making video simulations and



maintains a very active website with thousands of visits each month. Along with high-tech methods, the Center uses more traditional methods, including speaker series, lunch and dinner events, and the nationally-recognized Ethics Bowl Team, to support ethical leadership development at the Academy.

The final focus is on dissemination of information, and how to share the right information to the right audience in the right format.

"Part of our dissemination effort targets the Academy's staff, faculty and coaches," said Athens. "There is already a significant amount of information poured into midshipmen, and we don't want to miss those that have the most direct influence on the Brigade."

The Center has been actively developing events and interactions specifically for these influencers. In addition to disseminating resources through the website, the Center staff actively participates in the Capstone Seminar program, sponsors the Admiral Lawrence Ethics Essay Award competition and organizes professional development opportunities for Leadership, Ethics and Law faculty. Since 1999, the Center has used the book "Ethics for the Junior Officer" in its training and education. Recently, the book was distributed electronically for easier access by midshipmen and create the flexibility to add scenarios and cases to the book.

While the basics of ethical leadership and training have not changed at the Academy, the methods and tools will continue to evolve.

"Graduates, 40 years later, say how the formation at the Naval Academy was so critical," said Athens. Education and training at the Academy can help to provide an ethical foundation, however the Naval Academy is but one factor in service. "The

Naval Academy has a very distinct responsibility for about the first five to seven years of a person's career. After that point, there are a number of other influences that begin to impact the ethical decision making process of our graduates, but hopefully the Academy's influence has been so strong that the right foundation has been laid."

Ethics Through the Ranks

The four years midshipmen spend at the Academy are just the beginning of their formation as officers and as leaders. Those who continue their careers in the naval service have a profound responsibility to consider how ethical principles and personal values guide their decisions and their leadership of others.

"Today, our military is completing

12 years of combat in Iraq and Afghanistan. Through these years our joint force has focused its efforts on complex ground warfare, but now is the time to turn back to the fundamentals, our military's human building blocks, and refocus on our professional development and growth," said Rear Admiral Walter E. "Ted" Carter Jr. '81, USN, president of the Naval War College (NWC) in Newport, RI, where each year approximately 600 mid-career officers and promising leaders from other U.S. services, civilian federal agencies and international navies enroll as resident students in the NWC's rigorous 10-month course of postgraduate studies in strategy and policy, national security affairs and joint military operations. "I believe that all Americans have an expectation that everyone in the fleet, enlisted sailors through

admirals, will behave ethically and professionally, especially as we complete 40 years as an all-volunteer force."

From Admiral Carter's perspective, the issue is not that ethical transgressions are increasing or that leadership integrity has faltered—it is the speed with which transgressions and lapses are broadcast, not just throughout the fleet, but to the world at large. "When ships go to sea, sailors have this sense of 'out of sight, out of mind.' Nothing could be further from the truth," he said. "If any behavior is documented electronically—in personal email, in social media, anywhere—it lives forever. Awareness is higher, and the stakes are higher than ever before."

Admiral Carter remembers the ethical training he received during his time as a midshipman at the Naval Academy. "Leadership is a pyramid on which one grows. If you start with a solid base and continue to improve upon its foundation then your ability as a superior officer to make small corrective actions to positively affect your junior officers and sailors is much more likely to be successful," said Admiral Carter, who has received the Vice Admiral James Bond Stockdale Leadership award and the U.S. Navy League's John Paul Jones Award for Inspirational Leadership. "We need to recalibrate our moral compass regularly. Failures in character and judgment on even rare occasions greatly impact the ability for any command to function to its fullest potential. These lapses erode the trust and confidence of not only the crew within the fleet, but also, the American people in us as their Navy."

Admiral Carter maintains that the Navy's ethical training can be found in many places within the fleet, but only in a few locations with an in-depth, developed curriculum: the Naval Academy, the Naval War College, the Command Leadership School and the Senior Enlisted Academy. Naval leadership recognizes the need for that to change. Charged by Chief of Naval Operations Admiral Jonathan Greenert '75, USN, with leading the formation of a strategy for developing enlisted and officer leaders that reaches across every numbered fleet commander and within every naval installation, NWC created the Navy Leader Development Strategy. Approved by the CNO in January 2013, the strategy includes foundation outcomes that should be achieved by each sailor as his or her level of responsibility increases. This effort continues to evolve today through the Leader Development Continuum, which works with the Navy's community leadership—air, surface, sub-surface, SEAL, EOD, lawyers, chaplain and medical, for example, to identify if the Navy is doing enough to create the conditions for professional and ethical growth within its respective communities.

"Although great forward progress has been made, there is much more to be done," said Carter. "Teaching leaders how to develop ethical behavior in others is not an easy thing to do. But I believe that when people feel you trust them to do the right thing, they will. You must first show them what right looks like by leading their path. In other words, if you are going to talk the talk, you must be able to walk the walk. And this discussion must be done face-to-face with every member of your team. NWC is only one small part of the solution. The strength of our great Navy are the people who serve our great nation around the globe and who are standing watch to secure our freedom against any threat that lies on the horizon. Concerns with professional and ethical decisions will not be remedied overnight, but through a sustainable and methodical process of identification and recognition at every level, we can do better at filling in those small cracks that may develop in our ethical foundation." \$\psi\$





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An Outlook on Spring Sports

uring a recent, bygone era, the Navy men's lacrosse team was at the top of the Patriot League and a perennial NCAA tournament participant. Today, under third-year coach Rick Sowell, the Midshipmen are trying to rebuild the program and rejoin the NCAA

tournament conversation. Before that happens, Navy must become relevant once again in a conference that has grown into one of the tougher leagues in the sport.

The Mids have played collegiate lacrosse since 1908, and did not experience

their first losing season for 75 years. Last spring, nine years after playing in the NCAA tournament championship game, the bottom fell out at Navy, which unraveled in the season's second half by losing its final seven games to finish 3–10, the worst record in program history.

It marked the second losing season in three years in Annapolis. The Mids have missed the NCAAs for four straight seasons, have missed three consecutive Patriot League tournaments and have lost to Army a school-record—five times in a row.

"Everybody was under the microscope last summer," said Sowell, who is 9-16 in two years at Navy. "We need to re-establish our identity here. We want to be a team in superior condition that is sharp with our fundamentals and challenges our opponent in every way. We've got to be able to hang our hat on something."

With an offense that, despite the presence of proven attack weapons in Sam Jones '14 and Tucker Hull '14, sank to 58th in Division I by averaging just 7.92 goals per game, it's clear where Navy must improve the most. Scoring droughts were too common in 2012. The Mids managed only 41 goals during their season-ending 0-7 slide.

A lack of ball movement and shooting consistency were persistent problems, as Navy finished with only 51 assists. Possession time was also a major shortcoming, as the Mids won just 46 percent of their faceoffs and had trouble forcing turnovers to jump-start the offense into transition chances.

Sowell thinks Navy may have solved the faceoff problem with Brady Dove '17, one of 16 plebes and one of three from nearby Kent High School. Dove and Sean Reilly '16 each showed plenty of potential in the faceoff game in the fall.

"It looks like we'll have a faceoff-by-committee. The sophomores did some good things, but Brady had a really good fall," Sowell said. "If you can't win a faceoff, you can't put a [scoring] run together. We played an awful lot of defense last year."

The Mids spent a large amount of time in the fall working on dodging and shooting, as opposed to scrimmaging. It remains to be seen whether their athleticism has improved enough to make Jones (21 goals, 12 assists) and Hull (13, 8) more dangerous around the cage. Navy is counting on attackmen T.J. Hanzsche '16 and Patrick Keena '16. Each showed scoring flashes as freshmen. Hanzsche started eight games and scored 10 goals. Keena managed seven points in a backup role.

Navy needs more production out of a midfield that disappeared too often in 2012. Gabe Voumard '15 ranked second on the team with 15 goals, while Pat Durkin '14 chipped in 11 goals. Lefty Austin Heneveld '14 (12 points) could be the dodger the first group needs. Sean Price '14 and Erik Hoffstadt '14 lead the second midfield unit. They combined to produce nine goals and six assists last year.

"You can have the greatest schemes in the world, but it doesn't work if you don't have the guys to make it work," Sowell said.

After allowing 10.23 goals per game in 2013—and 12.6 goals per game over their last five losses—the Mids will rely on a younger group that has Sowell encouraged. The unquestioned leader is long-stick midfielder Pat Kiernan '14. He caused 26 turnovers last year, but scored only one goal. Nik Mullen '14 leads the close defense group that includes 6-foot-4 Matt Rees '17 and 6-3 Chris Fennell '17, each of whom spent a year at NAPS and could start. Jules Godino '16 also made good strides last fall.

The Mids need to cover opposing midfielders better on the wings. Alex Heyward '15 and Brendan Gaine '15 will lead the short-stick rotation. Goalie John Connors '16 replaced the graduated Nolan Hickey '13 by seizing the job in the fall.

If the Mids win more faceoffs consistently and generate more transition scoring, they should move back toward the middle of the Patriot League pack. But with the league now including Loyola and Boston University on top of established heavy hitters such as Bucknell, Lehigh and Colgate, Navy's margin of error is thin.

"There are no gimmes, that's for sure. Our sport has changed," said Sowell, alluding to Navy's 1-5 showing in league play last year and usual non-conference assignments such as Maryland and Johns Hopkins looming this spring. "There are a lot of 50-50 games out there, but we can't show up with our 'B' game and expect to win them. If I can get my seniors to play like seniors, we're going to be pretty good. But we've still got a long way to go."

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

Typically, when a team loses its top scorer—the most productive scorer in the nation—there is a significant cause for concern. But the Midshipmen, starting with sixth-year coach Cindy Timchal, are used to making up for a loss of excellent talent, and Navy expects to absorb the graduation of Jasmine DePompeo '13 without losing ground in the Patriot League.

A year after finishing 19-2, winning its third consecutive league title and bringing home the first-ever NCAA tournament victory in school history, Navy is ready to chase more milestones.

"Losing [DePompeo] to graduation gives other players an opportunity to step up. Our team is ready to compete," said Timchal, who owns a 76-22 record at Navy.

The Mids lost five starters, but return three of their top five scorers from a squad that overwhelmed opponents to the tune of 13.3 goals per game. Attackers Aimee Gennaro '14 and Loren Generi '15 each scored more than 60 goals and combined for 155 points. Midfielder Jill Coughlin '14 added 21 goals. The question is who will emerge as the feeders to stoke the Navy attack? DePompeo set an incredible standard in that area and finished with 71 assists in 2013. No one else had more than 16 assists in 2013.



The Story of a Signing

Nearly 30 years later, Bob Ravener '81 completed his signed baseball with baseball legend Cal Ripkin Jr.'s signature. Timchal likes the team's experience on offense, including returning attackers Molly Hamilton '14 and Katie Gallagher '16. Midfielder Casey Browne '15 scored nine goals as a backup a year ago.

Defensively, goalie Annie Foky '15 is the anchor. She went 17-2 and allowed just 7.13 goals per game. The unit in front of her is seasoned, led by Molly Doyle '16 and Lindsay Rheiner '15. They started a combined 28 games last year.

Among the newcomers, look for defenseman Meghan Maloney '17 and midfielders Aislinn Probst '17 and Kaitlan Moynihan '17 to make an impact.

The Mids will play Michigan and San Diego State in nonconference matchups, while the addition of Loyola and Boston University to the Patriot League will make it more difficult for Navy to dominate its league.

"Our focus is always to put the team in the best position to win the conference and get an automatic bid [to the NCAA tournament]. By adding two top 20 programs to our league, that will definitely be more of a challenge this year," Timchal said.


BASEBALL

The Mids lost the heart of their batting order to graduation in Dave Milanes '13 and Greg Dupell '13, lost three-year mainstay Ben Nelson '13 from their starting rotation, and said goodbye to shortstop David Wiedeman '15, who transferred to Creighton University because of a medical condition that sealed his departure from the Academy.

Ninth-year coach Paul Kostacopoulos, who guided Navy to a 28-23 record and a second-place finish in the Patriot League last spring, thinks the Mids will compensate with talented pitching, steady defense and speed that should allow Navy to manufacture more runs in 2014. Navy stole 57 bases in 71 attempts last year and committed just five errors in its final 18 games.

"We have to be more efficient on offense and take more chances on the bases. We've got to move more runners up," said Kostacopoulos, who has won 233 games at Navy, third-most in school history. "Our pitching is our strength, and we're as good defensively as any team we've had."

The foundation of the starting rotation is set with Anthony Parenti '15, Stephen Moore '15 and Luke Gillingham '16. The trio combined to make 28 starts last year. Parenti (12–11, 4.38 ERA) is a lefty who led the team in innings (64) and strikeouts (65). Moore (4–3, 3.24) and Gillingham (4–3, 3.23) bring power as right-handers.



The biggest question marks are in

the middle infield spots and at catcher. Travis Blue '17 made huge progress after plebe summer and has impressed with his defensive capability at second base, while shortstop Ryan Moody '16 showed a fine glove while taking over for the departed Wiedeman. Behind the plate, Chris Cannon '15 replaces Milanes.

MEN'S TENNIS

The men's team finds itself in unfamiliar territory. For only the third time in the past eight years, Navy is chasing a Patriot League title, not defending one. The Mids will also put a team on the court that does not have a senior, although John Officer, Navy's 29th-year coach, downplayed the significance of collegiate inexperience.

That's because Thomas Pecor '17, one of four freshmen on the roster, came as good as advertised from Memorial High School in Houston, TX. With an outstanding fall competing against the likes of University of Virginia, Princeton University and East Carolina University, Pecor shined. He entered the preseason as the team's No. 1 singles player and half of the No. 1 doubles team with Austin Jones '16. Jones went 14–8 last year, mostly playing in the No. 3 singles slot.

"[Pecor] is working on his first-save percentage, but he doesn't really have any weaknesses in his game," Officer said. "He hits a heavy ball and he has a great volley game. Our top

six players are each ranked in the top 150 in the country. We're scheduling tough. We think it's going to be a good year."

With Jones projected in the No. 2 singles spot, Calvin Mark '15 brings a 47–19 record from his first two seasons to the No. 3 position. Blake Daniel '15, 22–7 last year in singles play, is at No. 5, while Krishna Jana '17 had the inside track as the No. 5 player.

Officer expects the Mids to be in the thick of the race for the school's 10th league title. "It's not a good year unless we win the league," he said.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

Keith Puryear, the sixth-year coach of the women's team, has been at the helm throughout Navy's varsity existence and has guided the Mids to the Patriot League tournament finals in each of the last three years. Last year, the Mids went 25-5, won a school-record 17 straight matches, and wound up ranked 10th in the ITA Atlantic Region rankings.


This spring might reveal the deepest, most talented Navy team yet. For example, Gabby Winters '15 had a solid plebe year, before a broken wrist interrupted her sophomore season last spring. Winters, 10–8 in 2013, is fighting for a spot in the top six singles group.

"It's going to be harder to crack the starting lineup, more so now than ever," said Puryear, who has scheduled top 50 opponents in Penn State and DePaul University. "We're still a fairly young team, but we've got really good depth this year."

Navy will lean on Darien Sears '14 and Erin Snook '14, the lone seniors on the squad. They combined to win 44 matches last year and went 9-1 against Patriot League competition. But there is plenty of help in the under classes. Logan Antill '16 and Katie Porter '16 lead the sophomores. Antill led Navy with 25 matches last spring, while Porter went 15-4 and led the Mids in singles victories last fall. The incoming class features Summer Ralston '17, Audrey Channell '17 and Rozel Hernandez '17, who could factor into

Navy's competitive doubles picture.

If Snook can shake the nagging ankle injury that plagued her during the fall, the Mids could be primed to win that Patriot League title that has eluded them.



"We've leaned on Zack for four years," said 25th-year coach Stephen Cooksey. "He's able to take the weight and help us out where we need it."

Then there is Stell, the javelin throwing sensation who capped a phenomenal freshman year by winning the Patriot League crown—and Rookie of the Meet honors—before competing for Team USA at the Pan Am T&F Junior Championship last summer. In addition, the Mids have a stable of fine pole vaulters, led by league champion Mark Vetere '15. Navy also should score consistently in sprints with Austin Batiste '16 and Brett Borgard '14 and in middle distance events with Wes Kennedy '14 and Joshua Kingsland '15.

WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

The women's team has not finished lower than second at the Patriot League championships in the past 10 years, and last year's second-place team will lean on a dependable core of talent in 2014. Like the men, the throwers—in this case, four seniors—set the tone for the Mids.

Maressa Guynn '14 is the league's defending discus champion. She won last year's conference meet by setting Academy and Patriot League records. Teronda Brown '14 finished second in the shot put and fourth in the discus. Laura Allam '14 was second in the discus and fifth in the shot put. In the javelin throw, Alix Membreno '14, who also stars on the basketball team, won the Patriot League crown.

Guynn, Allam and Membreno each qualified for the NCAA East Regionals.

"People have really started to take notice of our throwers, especially outdoors," said 22nd-year coach Carla Criste. "To have four of them is pretty unusual."

The Mids must compensate for the loss of distance star Brigid Byrne '13, and Annie Norah-Beveridge '15 was the team's most consistent scorer for two years while she pushed Byrne. Norah-Beveridge was second behind Byrne in the 10,000 at last year's Patriot League meet. Christina Blair '15 was a remarkably consistent top five finisher in the 3,000 steeplechase. Amanda Mulkey '16 also peaked nicely at the end of her freshman year with a third-place finish at the Patriot League meet in the 1,500m.

The graduation of Jessica Ridgway '13 leaves Navy lacking depth in the sprints, although Veronica Ffrench '14 can give the Mids a lift in the 200m, as well as the high jump, and Alana Brady '17 has shown much promise in the 400m.

Crystan McLymore '16 could give Navy a big boost in the long jump and triple jump. McLymore is the reigning Patriot League champion in the triple jump.

LIEUTENANT COMMANDER DAN B. CNOSSEN '02, USN, HAS NEVER MET AN OBSTACLE HE COULDN'T OVERCOME.

hen Cnossen accepted his offer to attend the United States Naval Academy in 1998, he didn't know how to swim.

That limitation didn't stop the driven plebe from setting his sights on becoming a Navy SEAL. Cnossen believed he could learn how to swim if he put the work in—and that he did.

In 2009, seven years after his graduation from the Naval Academy, Cnossen had

risen to the rank of platoon commander for SEAL Team One in Afghanistan in the fourth combat deployment of his career. Just 36 hours into his assignment, Cnossen stepped on an improvised explosive device, resulting in the loss of both legs just above the knee.

Just as he didn't allow his inability to swim hold him back from his SEAL dreams, Cnossen didn't let his injury prevent an active life. The SEAL underwent rehabilitation at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda, MD, where he learned to walk with prosthetics. He was awarded both a Purple Heart and a Bronze Star with Valor medal from the Secretary of the Navy for his service in combat.

Cnossen wasn't sure what his options for physical activity would be following his injuries; what he did know was that he wouldn't be sitting around for long. He began working with the Paralympic Military Program, which provides post-rehabilitation support, mentoring and adaptive sports training for injured service members. Through that experience, Cnossen realized he could not just adapt to but excel in his new condition.

"I would have had a very, very hard time coming out of Walter Reed and going into a sedentary life," Cnossen said. "If the Paralympic program didn't exist, I really don't know where I'd be right now or what I'd be doing."

As Cnossen redeveloped his strength and became comfortable on prosthetics, the former triathlete began running and swimming again, even capturing four medals—including three golds—at the 2011 Warrior Games

He then learned to use a sit-ski, without knowing much about Nordic skiing prior to his injury. Once again, though, he didn't let lack of experience faze him.

"Given that I was going to be in the sitting class, I imagined that if someone had a background in cross-country skiing, it wouldn't be as a sitting athlete," Cnossen said. "So what I presumed was that nobody really started out the first years of their lives doing this, and in that regard I would be no different. I was pretty confident in my athletic background and capability."

Cnossen spoke with his chain of command and was approved to stay on active duty with the Navy while competing on the international racing circuit in adaptive cross-country skiing and biathlon. In his first season of competition, Cnossen notched a silver medal at the International Paralympic Committee World Cup in Cable, WI, and a sixth-place finish at the IPC Cross-Country Skiing World Championships in Sweden. His results were strong enough to earn him a spot on the U.S. Paralympics Nordic Skiing National Team.

Cnossen then went on to earn three national cross-country skiing titles and a second-place finish in the biathlon at the 2013 U.S. Nordic Adaptive National Championships in Midway, UT.

Now, he is a top hopeful for Team USA in both Nordic skiing disciplines for the upcoming Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games. The Paralympic team that will compete in Sochi will be named in early 2014.

Since joining the Paralympic Military Program in August 2011, Cnossen has been living and training full-time in Fort Carson, CO. His training is largely self-driven, though the National Team comes together for a training camp for about 10 days each month.

The National Team has a large contingent of military veterans, something Cnossen said has aided in his positive attitude during recovery and his continued motivation to succeed. In addition, Cnossen said his experiences as a midshipman at the Naval Academy and as a member of the military have prepared him well for the rigors of an athletic career.

"I think cross-country skiing and biathlon are two sports which require a good amount of mental training, not just on the day of the race, but before," Cnossen said. "There are days when I have to leave my legs in the snow, and I come back and they're caked in snow, the prosthetic fluid isn't really working and my hands are freezing. But the toughness to push through it? My military background has given me that."

Though Cnossen's biggest goal is to be on the roster to Sochi, he knows the

real reward will have been the journey to get there.

"I used to think, 'I'm hospital-bed bound.' Then I started realizing that I still have a pretty capable body," Cnossen said. "I'm not too limited—there are these prosthetics, and who knows what they can do? I decided to focus more on the physical side of my development, and I've learned a lot about myself through the process."

The 2014 Paralympic Winter Games are set for 7-16 March in Sochi, Russia. The Paralympics will be broadcast on NBC and NBC Sports Network. \$\psi\$

Our Navy—On Watch, On Call, Worldwide

During the last three months of 2013, the world landscape shifted significantly and will directly affect naval operations this coming year. First, of course, are the historic discussions with Iran which may lead to longer term stability in the Mideast at the cost of near term uncertainty and with the final outcome in Syria a major unknown. Second is a significant uptick in Chinese naval activity in the Western Pacific. While we all hope for the best, the U.S. Navy must be ready for the worst as much of the U.S. military returns to our shores after a decade in Iraq and Afghanistan.

In the Middle East, American troop withdrawals will come to an end in 2014, and few ground forces will remain for the long term. As a result, the Navy will be the only service with a persistent presence in the region, and operations could not be more complicated. Complicated because, while talks between the United States and Iran are pointing to a more stable future, Iran is openly advancing its military capabilities in the short term: from commissioning a new wide area radar system, aggressively flying drones over the Persian Gulf, developing new anti-ship missiles, trying to acquire advanced air defense weapon systems like the Russian SA-300 surface-to-air missile system and expanding its torpedo-boat program. Indeed, a number of Arab countries are concerned enough to have engaged the U.S. on negotiating arms purchases as a counterweight to Iran's continued military modernization. Adding the fact that the U.S. military response to Syria has been primarily naval to date, and 2014 portends to be a challenging and potentially dangerous environment for our ships at sea in the region.

Second, China's military posture has ramped up. After the recent election of President Xi Jinping, there was a rapid increase in out of area Chinese military operations and, frankly, some overt behavior. First and foremost is the deployment of the Chinese aircraft carrier, LIAONING, to the Philippines; an associated flashback of the Cold War with Chinese warships maneuvering aggressively close aboard COWPENS; the no-notice establishment of an Air Defense Identification Zone with operating rules outside the norm and even covering disputed territory; more aggressive territorial claims of disputed islands in the South China Seas; and going to mass production of its J-15 fighter (an indigenous Chinese version of the capable Russian Su-33 carrier-based aircraft). All in all, 2013 closed with Chinese military operations at a new high water mark.

Our friends and allies in the region—from Australia in the south to Singapore to Japan to South Korea in the north—are unsure of China's rise, their ambiguous intentions and the extent of their military buildup. What makes today's situation so unusual is the strength of economic ties: China is a major trading partner with both the United States and Japan. This is a sharp distinction to the Cold War with the Soviet Union and Warsaw Pac nations and, as a result, it seems as if there are two conflicting conversations taking place concerning China: economic cooperation versus military competition. All of which makes the life of a Sailor on deployment in 7th Fleet more uncertain.

On the Patuxent

A predictor of career success

* Our classmate, **Bernard "Dunk" Dunkle,** was a collector and keeper of many kinds of papers and documents relating to his time as a Midshipman and officer in the Marine Corps. Recently his widow, Betsy, came across one captioned "Special Order No. 5–35, Midshipman Officers and Petty Officers, 1934–1935, Final Group." Believing it might be of interest to the Class she kindly forwarded it. Even at this late date it is worthy of a close look and an analysis.

* At the beginning of our First Class year in September 1934 the Executive Department announced that there would be three distinct groups of officers and petty officers appointed to be the Midshipman military leaders of the Regiment, as collectively we were called. For some, never explained reason, the Academy used Army terms to describe

the echelons of our formations: squad, platoon, company, battalion and regiment, instead of the available and venerable navy terms, division, squadron, force, flotilla, and fleet.

*The first group, chosen during the summer, served from the start of the academic year until the Christmas holidays, the next held their ranks from our return early in the New Year until 25 March, 1935 and a final set consisting of those considered to be the best overall were to hold office from then until graduation. Our *Lucky Bag* shows pictures of those in the two earlier sets but not of the final one as it was appointed too late for its photo to get into the production schedule. Those appointed were permitted to wear their insignia of rank only during the time of their service.

*The selection of those to form the Final Group was based on the judgment of members of the Executive Department assembled under the Commandant of Midshipmen. No written report of their deliberation survives and it is doubtful if one was prepared. The documentation was just the recommended organization. We do not know if the Commandant chaired the meetings or merely awaited their report. His decision, merely concurring or possibly somewhat modifying his subordinates' submission was then sent to the Superintendent who almost certainly approved it without change.

* The general feeling at that time was that the officer leadership at the Academy believed those chosen for the final top positions, the Midshipman Commander who wore five stripes on the sleeves of his blue service uniform, Midshipman Lieutenant Commanders who wore four stripes and Midshipman Lieutenants who wore three stripes were the members of our Class the executive Department at the Academy thought had shown the best military attitude and had the greatest potential for eventual success in the Navy.

* Now, many years later, as the putative historian of the USNA Class of 1935, it may be appropriate to examine whether that prediction of eventual success in the Navy held true. At the top of the "Final Set" were the Five Striper, five Four Stripers and fifteen Three Stripers; a total of twenty-one. No names are included here since the data need no personal identifications for validity.

* During the period around World War II four of the twenty-one were casualties, leaving seventeen to be leading candidates for top Navy positions in the late 1960s when they became available to us. Class records show that one member of the Class became a Four Star officer in the Marine Cops and one was appointed to Four Star rank in the Navy. Five acceded to Three Stars in the Navy and one became a Three Star officer in the Marine Corps.

*A comparison of former stripers against those who achieved high rank shows that of the seventeen living former top stripers none gained a four star rank and just two became three star officers. Moreover, three of the six who became three star officers had not even been appointed stripers but were relegated to petty officer status by the Commandant in the final 1935 organization.

* We leave to our readers to decide whether there is significance in this analysis.

Obituary -

Mrs. Grace Cleghorn Giffen, 98, widow of Captain Robert C. Giffen, Jr., USN (Ret) '38, of Wahiawa, HawaiiI and Annapolis, Md., died October 22 of old age. Born in her maternal grandparents' home on Kahuku Sugar Plantation, Kahuku, Territory of Hawaii, on January 4, 1915, to the late Grace Olsen Cleghorn and William Arthur Cleghorn, Grace grew up in an exotic world full of animals, agriculture and bare feet. At home, peacocks acted as watchdogs and a wild piglet, Baby, which Grace raised, would follow her to school. In 1932, when her parents moved to Haiku, Maui, where her father worked for the Haiku Fruit Company, Grace was left behind on Oahu to board at Punahou School. It was there that she took swimming lessons from Duke Kahanamoku, an early Hawaiian Olympian, and became a strict grammarian. Despite her fluency in pidgin English, Grace never mistook the proper use of the personal pronouns I and me. After graduating from Punahou she returned home to Maui. When her mother died unexpectedly, her father, looking for a change of scenery, took both his teenage daughters on a 'round-the-world tour. Returning six months later, Grace was off to business school. Upon graduation and until 1944, she worked as the personal secretary to the president of Honolulu Rapid Transit. But, as a Victorian daughter, she also kept her father's house until he remarried. Grace remembered the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor only too well a bomb, a dud, landed in their front yard during the Japanese attack on Wheeler Airfield and Schofield Barracks.

It was during the War that Grace met her husband of 59 years, Capt. Robert (Skip) C. Giffen, Jr., USN, of Annapolis, MD. Skip was a submariner, in and out of Pearl Harbor on patrol when a mutual friend introduced them. They were married six weeks later — four of which Skip was gone — in a formal service at St. Andrew's Cathedral, Honolulu, serenaded by Hawaiian music. What followed was a typical military life, lots of moves, lots of new friendships and frequent separations. Somehow Skip always managed to get

Grace back to the Islands every two or three years. And Grace, when asked where she was from, always said Hawaii.

Following Skip's retirement, the couple settled in Annapolis in 1967 where Grace, an avid bridge player and gifted knitter, made new friends. In addition to knitting, Grace enjoyed travel, historical novels and flower arranging. Grace loved parties and accordingly loved the holidays. Her all time record was four different parties in a single evening. At the time of her death, Grace had outlived most of her contemporaries but she will continue to be loved by her family and friends for her strong sense of propriety, perfect grammar and encyclopedic knowledge of Emily Post.

Grace was preceded in death by her mother in 1934, father in 1959, husband on April 16, 2003, brother, C.T. (Tom) Cleghorn of Wahiawa, Hawaii in 1972 and sister Dagmar C. Baldwin, Haiku, Maui, Hawaii in 1973. She is survived by her daughter Dagmar G. Cosby, her son Robert C. Giffen III (and wife Ann Lallande); her four grandchildren: Erin C. Plumb (and husband Marion), Carrington G. Cosby, Robert C. Giffen IV (and wife Katelyn), Nicole L. Giffen and her two great grandchildren: Grace and Emma Plumb.

A private inurnment at the U.S. Naval Academy on November 8, 2013, was followed by a memorial service at Friendship Hall, Ginger Cove, Annapolis, MD.The family requests that memorial donations in her name be made to: Punahou School, 1601 Punahou St., Honolulu HI 96822. Don Brown, our assistant class secretary, reports on his recent trip to South America:

"On October 6 my son, Gordon, and I departed from Fairfax, VA, for a threeweek trip to the West Coast of South America from Ecuador to Chile on a 178 passenger small ship (Sea Adventurer). Son was a last minute substitute for my wife who had emergency gall bladder removal four days prior to our departure. The expedition was led by Zegrahm Enterprises, Seattle, Wash., to visit historical sites, learn geography and observe wildlife, primarily birds. Landed in Quito, Ecuador where we spent a day recovering from the journey. Toured the city that focused on the colonial period. Flew to Guayaquil, Ecuador (of note was the city's express bus system with its dedicated lanes and stop stations). From there,

after a tour of the colonial area, we proceeded by bus to the port of Salinas where the low water required us to use Zodiac boats to transfer to the ship. The ship's officers were from Argentina (Captain), Croatia, Germany and other countries but the crew was primarily Filipino. Following day was at sea with lectures. The next stop was Salaverry, Peru. We toured an ancient archeological site of early Indians and their separate site of administration. We were denied permission to visit one nature reserve site due to Peruvian naval maneuvers and diverted to Lima. There we toured the oldest plaza in Lima and the oldest home, the Casa Aliaga, where we visited 10 of the 80 rooms in the house. We then docked at Pisco. Peru where Gordon flew to view the Nazca Lines (expansive earth markings best viewed from the air) and Paracas National Reserve (pre-Incan culture) while I remained aboard due to a bad reaction to my high altitude medication. Got a Zodiac ride around the port captained by the ship's CAPTAIN. Saw seals, sea lions and pelicans in abundance. Next day at sea with lectures. Arrived at Arica, Chile and toured the main plaza and an unusual metal cathedral designed in Paris. Toured the Lauca National Park and stopped at the small town of Putre known for producing oregano. On to Iquique, Chile where we toured the Regional Museum, Main Plaza, Naval Museum and Spanish cultural center. We spent a day at sea. We were denied landing at Lohta, Chile, for unknown reasons and were forced to spend a fourth day at sea. The next stop was Valdivia, Chile. The museum was of interest but little else was remarkable. Next was Chiloe Island where we visited the San Antonio Fortthe final defense of Spain against the liberators of South America. On our last day, we docked at Puerto Montt where we visited the local fish market and the Saltos de Petrohe Waterfall in the Vincente Perez Rosalas National Park.

Overall, we were exposed to an eclectic, broad range of sites: ancient Indian sites, colonial buildings from homes to municipal and national buildings, present day living: town squares, craft markets and vegetable and fish markets, and outstanding on board lectures. Most noticeable was graffiti that was endemic except in protected areas. Also, there was used building material dumped everywhere, even in the breakdown lanes of the highways and any open space primarily along the Pan American Highway and

areas within reasonable distance of urban areas as well as vacant lots in urban areas. Also, the homes of one story almost everywhere had rebar sticking up since they build as they can afford—expecting to add a story, they install the rebar when they build the first story. The most memorable moment probably was eating a boiled barnacle at our last stop in Chile. Our guide said it was the only place in the world he knew of that sold barnacles of that type. They were 8" to 11" in length with a half dollar size opening, and tasted a little like scallops but less chewy. This was the fourth trip I have taken with Zegrahm and they never cut corners and always please but you do pay (willingly) for the care and attention you get."

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Wendi Winters reports on Bill Scott's Funeral

■ Bill had a beautiful military sendoff, with the unit, the band and the rider-less black horse and caisson. His coffin was silhouetted in the sunlight as it was solemnly escorted into the Old Chapel at Ft.Myer.

His son William John Scott IV delivered a solid, moving eulogy about what it was like to live with an eternally cheerful, euphemistic father, despite some of the horrors Bill experienced during World War II. Afterwards, most of us walked into Arlington Cemetery behind the caisson.

I suspect my Dad helped pick out the gravesite when Bill's wife Thelma passed away in '92. It had his fingerprints all over it – it was in Section 1 and close to several other classmates and their family members whom Dad had, similarly, helped in their time of need. To the cemetery staff, he was a familiar figure often involved in planning funerals and dealing with other details when a classmate or close friend passed away.

This site was just a few yards from the Old Chapel and the cemetery gates. However, the caisson, the honor guard and the band all turned right and, with us following, made a quarter-mile loop around that part of the cemetery before coming to a halt near the gravesite.

After the band finished and the sole bugler played "Taps," a bagpiper standing alone among the tombstones began the mournful wail of "Amazing Grace."

Bill's daughter Mary Scott, whom many of us have met at Class functions as she accompanied her dad everywhere in his later years, accepted the folded flag from the Navy chaplain who had conducted the service inside the chapel.

Before we set off for the gravesite portion of the service, I had a brief chat with Bob Kaufman, the sole classmate in attendance. He's still busy as president of Vinson Hall, where he lives. And, Bob just got a hot new set of wheels.

"What did you buy?" I asked.
With a mischievous twinkle in his eye
he replied: "A Mercedes." It's a beaut!

In the PT boat business at Guadalcanal he was severely burned during an attack, and went through a long convalescence. After retirement from active duty he earned a doctorate from Yale University and went on to teach at Middlebury College, a delightful college in Vermont where he rose to the rank of Professor. He was a faithful participant in the summer experiences at the Castine Caper, and wrote a delightful recap, Castine Caper 1970 - 2005. Writing is what he did, but he also included a treasure of photos from the annual Caper. As he wrote - "I enclose a few pictures. My trouble is that I don't take pictures of people posing - I get them doing something. And scenery. And fog. I hope you enjoy the narrative. It is sad, in a way. So many people are dead. But by George they had fun when they were alive!" That's a great way to remember John and the Castine Caper. Earlier, on 30 August, Cary Baldwin died at La Costa Glen in Carlsbad, CA, a retirement community.

His widow wanted his death reported, only. Last I knew, Cliff Bundy's widow, Cissi, and John Hardy's widow were still living at La Costa Glen. Finally, Warren **Lowerre** died 13 October, just four days after his 95th birthday, at Good Samaritan Retirement Village in Denton, TX. Warren was on Maryland at Pearl Harbor and stayed on the same ship through the Pacific Theater until the end of the war. He then moved to Dallas where he worked for Texas Instruments, eventually retiring to the golf course. With John Clagett gone, the mantle of oldest living classmate passes to **Stormy Karl**, born 5/16/16. Take care of yourself Stormy. Two years later, the couple were husband and wife. Lucy, also an accomplished balloonist with many awards and acknowledgements, said her

passion for ballooning rubbed off on her husband. "He was a Navy pilot, and he didn't want to go up in a balloon," she said. "Balloons were the slow road," Stefan said. He fell in love with ballooning once he realized not only how technically difficult it was, but also once he experienced the thrill of reaching record heights tens of thousands of feet above the ground. So far as I know, Karl is the only classmate who is a balloonist. I have decided not to ask him for a ride. But this expands the record which demonstrates that

Williams has been so encouraged by the response, he is now extending his outreach to high schools across the country. It is a big job, but **Williams** says, despite his age, he is up for it.

"I'm 92 years old, and this last year has been the most productive and happiest of my life," he said."

And from the pen of Starkey:

"Navy experience unforgettable" (Pittsburgh Tribune-Review) published on 26 October 2013 10:56 p.m.—This is an absolutely wonderful column, a must read, that appeared after the Navy Homecoming Game with Pittsburg. If you have a computer and can read the rest of the column, you definitely should.

"Outside the stadium, on a glorious afternoon glimmering in gold and blue (both teams' colors), the Navy tailgate parties are arranged by graduation year. You are drawn to the sign that reads "Class of 1945" and to the three old men behind it.

One is 92-year-old **Bill Campbell**, a former Navy lacrosse captain from Philadelphia. He explains that the Class of '45 graduated in 1944, a day after the Invasion of Normandy.

Campbell soon would join the fray. He participated in the Battle of Leyte Gulf in the Philippines, where the Navy took control of the seas, sinking 23 enemy warships.

Sharp as a tack, **Campbell** recounts the Battle of Surigao Strait (part of Leyte) as he slowly walks toward the gates. It is remembered as the last battleship-versusbattleship action in military history. Five of the six U.S. ships had been restored after being damaged or sunk at Pearl Harbor.

Campbell says his ship fired the torpedo that sunk the famous Japanese battleship Fuso.

Is he glad he chose to attend the Naval Academy?

"Oh, hell yeah," he says."

The following was received from Tuck Huev as sent to Lee Zeni:

Dear Lee

As I have told you before my writing ability is marginal at best. You should also remember that my career began very early in my life and that I've been plain "lucky". Here goes with a brief history that explains how good fortune can help make things work out.

I began my Naval career in the Class of 1945 with roommates like "Buzz" Johnston and "Shot" Wendt. I didn't get to Annapolis until late summer of 1941 and was assigned a room occupied by two guys in their twenties who were out practicing football when I arrived at the room. I had disposed of my civvies and was lugging a huge box of bedclothes, white works, etc. in which I had been told to stencil my name and laundry hamper. As my roommates had preceded me by several hours and days, I started out making an upper bunk as the lower bunk and single bed were made. Several hours later the door was slung open and these two guys burst in with five o'clock shadows, commenting on the mess I had created. I thought they were upper class men and so I came to attention having been briefed by a 'middy' from Kentucky. I thought he was knowledgeable since he was to graduate in December 1942. He was from my high school and town in Kentucky; his name was Hugh M. Durham - known as "Bull". Introductions of my roommates followed and "Buzz" Johnston and "Shot" Wendt couldn't handle my given name of Marshall. Therefore since I said I had come from Louisville, Kentucky, I was so named "Tucky". Later when I began to shave, we agreed to "Tuck" to placate the older guys.

Since my two roomies were flushed with the football season the three of us went to a movie in Mahan Hall on Sunday. December 7th, 1941. Upon leaving the movie, we proceded back Stribling Walk to Bancroft Hall. This wasn't the thing to do, as we soon learned, the duty watch squad had been issued 45 caliber pistols and the entrance to the arena in front of Bancroft Hall was barred from Sunday guests (Moms, Pops and Girl Friends) because Pearl Harbor had been attacked. Needless

to say we three Plebes were in the dark where and what was Pearl Harbor??? However, we along with the guest civilians soon found out!!

My shortened Plebe year was a breeze compared with other Plebes who went on to graduate in June 1945. By the spring of 1942, I had gone unsat in calculus and appeared before the academic board. This experience was different in that 8 Captains and Rear Admirals were overwhelming with all of their stripes and insignias, which made my sleeves, seem even barer. On the way back to Louisville after being sent home, I stopped by Capital Hill to visit Congressman O'Neill to thank him for the appointment and to tell him how sorry I was to have flunked calculus and out of the Academy. He said he was equally sorry and told me that he had no more candidates in his district for USNA and only two for West Point. Thus the good fortune prevailed and I came back to the Naval Academy a second time to the good old Class of 1946 in the fall of 1942. This is when I picked up another friend named Billy-Bob Montgomery! He had previously been a roommate of Tom Sulik and 'Sweds' Hansen of Class of 1945. Billy-Bob and I joined each other as any two lost souls would do - it lasted many years and I was schedule to graduate with you and others

I have been lucky enough to know such other characters as Al White and Hal Hamberg (both 1945 and 1946), Don Iselin 1946, all special guys I met in my second Plebe year and of all people Levio E. Zeni 1946 (most call him Lee). Remember we met in Texas at flight school along with other guys with the same ambitions. Wally Schirra, one of America's first astronauts. William Whallen, Dave Barksdale, and William "Bill" Campbell, all great guys. We were the early birds in aviation along with another - lest we forget "Billy Bob" Monty Montgomery, my roommate, who died in my arms after many years together.

How did I know we were to graduate in June 1945 instead of in 1946? All in all my luck has been astounding and I thank you for your super help.

From John Corse, Jacksonville, FL

"About 50 years ago I enjoyed sailing a 16' Hobie catamaran off the beach here in Jacksonville. I have photographic proof that even my mother-in-law, Helen Murchison, in those days somehow trusted me to deliver her safely back to terra firma! My wife, Muffet, lost that faith after I dumped her and my five-year-old daughter when a rogue wave caught us and catapulted the Hobie end over end in the surf. No serious damage to anything except for a bent mast and Muffet's hairdo, which had just been styled for a party!

After being used and abused by children and grandchildren, the Hobie was abandoned behind the sand dunes with several holes and scrapes in her pontoons, the canvas "trampoline" deck disintegrated and the sails disappeared —a sorry sight. About five years ago, I had the hull picked up and brought to my home in Jacksonville with vague thoughts of restoring it.

Then an article in a boating magazine about a solar-powered catamaran fishing boat intrigued me and inspired an effort to use the Hobie hull as the platform for such a vessel. Although I am still practicing law, I recently suffered from an ailment which

required treatment with massive doses of a drug called prednisone which knocked my immune system down severely. As a result, I was confined to my home to avoid contracting any infectious disease and had time on my hands, so with the help of my yard man, we started the conversion. We completely disassembled the boat, removed all the sailing gear, fiberglassed the hull damage and repainted the pontoons.

We then built a new deck out of two-by-fours covered with 3/8 inch marine plywood; epoxied and painted the deck; raised the railing which formerly supported the trampoline by inserting some aluminum pipe — creating a safety railing around the cockpit to keep us oldsters from toppling over the sides.

A 75-watt solar panel was installed between the bows, which charges two batteries which in turn supply power to a small electric trolling motor mounted on the stern.

We built a bracket for the trolling motor with two-by-eight lumber so it is strong enough to support a small gas outboard motor if I want to get to fishing spots more quickly. Believing in simultaneous employment of belts and suspenders at my age, I added oars and a modified windsurfer sail and mast so that I am sure to get back to land if the sun goes behind the clouds and the batteries fail! In my better days, I wouldn't have bothered about this surplusage since I was sure I could swim to shore from any

location in the St. Johns River (3 miles wide in front of my home). But times have changed, I must admit!"

For your orientation and mine I am writing this on 24 Nov. '13 for submission on the 26th.

Let us begin with one of those items I have spoken of before, something I have sent to my email address book but believe you Shipmate readers without email will also enjoy it. The author is Tom Murphree 24th Co. (see both 30 and 50 year books if you have them.)

"After we had been in the Academy 10 days or so, I convinced Geoff Beardall (non-grad) that he should get his mother to have a Sunday afternoon party at the Supe's House and invite a half dozen of us Plebes to meet a few local young ladies. To my surprise, she agreed.

On 25 July 1944, 14 days after our entry I met CDR Sterling's daughter, Janet, age 17 at that party. We six mids were waiting nervously on the first floor for about five minutes, and then the procession of young ladies began, down the stairs from the floor above. I had been out of any social circuit for a couple of years, so I was modestly keyed up and highly expectant. The appraisal began and we were not disappointed. One by one, they all passed inspection. From our vantage point, the ankles and legs came into view first, so by the time they reached the bottom of the stairs, a fair and just inspection had been completed. When the fourth appeared, I was impressed with the shapely legs and focused on the continuing descent. My intuition was rewarded, as behold, I saw a most gorgeous, beautiful young lady, naturally poised and unpretentious, good posture....I was warming up to the occasion! I saw no tactical advantage to standing idly by, so I moved quickly to insure that I reached the bottom of the stairs at the same time as she. Presenting myself as best as I could, I smiled as best I could, and introduced myself, "I'm Tom Murphree". "Janet Sterling", she said. I offered my right arm (I can't believe it!), she placed her left hand on mine (with a

smile) and I escorted her to a less populated area of the large, sumptuous living room, suitable for what was to be an engaging conversation. No giddy, nervous talk, but communications were enhanced by an encouraging smile, an appropriate amount of humor and captivating, continual, encouraging eye contact. A wonderful experience.... We were married three years later, 7 June 1947 at 2pm, at their beautiful place in Bucks County, PA, Admiral and Mrs. Beardall, ex-neighbors, 6 classmates, family and friends attending. Cdr Sterling was the head of the Reserve Battalion, if you remember.

We reside happily at Shorewood Cottage on Bogue Sound, Carteret County, NC. When I look out the window and see Janet moving about our beautiful garden, I still get a charge out of the above reflections. I've never done anything to deserve it, but I am truly blessed. For proof, stop by 677 Hwy 24, Newport, NC, 3 miles west of Morehead City. 252-726-3737! Welcome"

Next is a letter from Charlie Butler 8th Co.

■ "As we observed the 50th anniversary of President Kennedy's assassination, I was reminded of the unusual circumstances under which Rosemary and I First heard the sad news.

In the summer of 1962, I was ordered to Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines, which was our largest overseas base at the time. I was in charge of a large construction program that included a new base hospital, which I turned over to the Air Force in the spring of 1965, just in time for it to be featured regularly on the evening news as the first stop for the increasing numbers of wounded coming back from Vietnam.

In November of 1963, I arranged a 10-day leave to visit friends in Tokyo. They had just bought a new house and they wanted us to be their first houseguests.

Rosemary had recently read an article about Commodore Matthew Perry's visit to Japan in 1854. He had anchored his fleet off the town of Shimoda, at the end of the peninsula that forms the west side of Tokyo Bay. Commodore Perry sent a delegation overland to Tokyo to announce his coming, so that the sudden appearance of his fleet in Tokyo Bay would not be viewed as a threatening gesture. In 1856, our first Consul–General to Japan also landed at Shimoda. With so much history to recommend it, we asked our friends to arrange for us to make an overnight visit to Shimoda.

Rosemary and I took a train from Tokyo to Kamakura, which is famous for its huge reclining Buddha. A taxi was waiting for us there to take us the 20 or so miles to Shimoda. Our hotel was small and very attractive. At dinner, we learned that we were the only Americans there that night, and that very few Americans ventured out to Shimoda.

When we went down to breakfast the next morning, we were a little late and the dining room was fairly full. As soon as we entered, everyone stood up and bowed to us. When they didn't return to their chairs, the bewildered look on our faces prompted a Japanese gentleman to come over and ask, "Haven't you heard the news?" "What news?" I replied. "Your President Kennedy was shot and killed in Texas." We stood there in total shock and disbelief.

After we had regained our composure, we thanked the gentleman, bowed to the other guests, and returned to our room. We had planned to walk around Shimoda that morning, but, instead, we asked the front desk to call our taxi so we could go back to Tokyo as soon as possible. We will never forget the way the Japanese showed us their respect and shared our grief that day and in the days that followed. It was a very moving and reassuring experience."

Charlie also wrote:

Although neither of us is driving these days, Rosemary and I are managing to maintain an active social life, since we have many friends who are happy to pick us up and take us to lunches, dinners, and parties. Coral Gables still proudly maintains its reputation as "The City Beautiful" and Miami was recently named as the most diverse city in the world—more so than London or New York! In short: What a great place to live and enjoy our "Golden Years"! Best wishes and BEAT ARMY! Charlie

Speaking Before Thinking

We all have our memories of Plebe Year. In our dealings with upper classmen, some of them were pleasant, but most of them were not. Here's one that Tom **Watkins** would just as soon forget, except that he still chuckles every time he tells the story.

■ "Early in Plebe Year, while serving as messenger on watch, I was sent to another Battalion Office by Midshipman Officer of the Watch William St. George, Class of 1947, a fearsome four-striper. I entered the designated Battalion Office, stood at attention and sounded off as required, 'Midshipman Watkins, Fourth Class, Sir.' To say that I was nervous, would be an understatement, for when asked to state my business, I responded, 'Saint Peter sent me, Sir' and brought down the house with laughter."

Our versatile, globe-trotting webmaster, Red **Tolbert** tells a tale of his patrol squadron's visit in 1952 to one of the fiercest, bloodiest battle grounds of World War II:

"Iwo Jima is a tear-shaped island about five miles in length, oriented NE to SW with the big end of the tear to the NE. Mt. Suribachi is on the SW tip. At its widest part, the island measures about two miles. The Japanese created a dense network of bunkers and hidden artillery positions and some eleven miles of underground tunnels.

"The WWII landing started 19 February and ended 26 March 1945. Of 21,000 Japanese troops defending the island, only a few hundred survived. U.S. troops killed in action numbered over 6,000 with over 19,000 wounded. These figures, along with those of Okinawa,

influenced President Truman to drop the A-bomb, rather than invade Japan.

"My squadron, Patrol Squadron FOUR (VP-4) was deployed to Guam during the Korean War. We were the *ready mining squadron* to mine certain objectives if things got worse for U.S. forces during that Cold War time. Also on Guam was VS-21, a carrier-based antisubmarine squadron of AF aircraft.

"A typhoon was approaching Guam and ships were put to sea to evade the storm. Aircraft didn't have to evacuate until the storm's track was established. Our long-range aircraft were ordered to evacuate to Kwajalein, except for Crew 10. We were assigned the task of providing navigation aid to Iwo Jima for VS-21 aircraft. Classmate John **Dixon** was one of the VS-21 pilots; his CO was CDR Cal Durgin.

"The "GO" came and we departed with the AFs milling around us. We had to fly at 135 knots for them to keep up without burning all their fuel before reaching Iwo. However, all aircraft arrived safely and we got settled in.

"As an epilogue, some of the VS pilots, having fallen victim to *John Barleycorn*, decided to *storm Suribachi* the night before our return to Guam. There were injuries (not Dixon), but with no x-ray equipment on the island, the extent of injuries couldn't be determined. The injured were put in cage baskets and loaded into our P2V-2 for the trip back to Guam and the hospital. Cal Durgin gave the injured an award – I think, a week in quarters!"

Class News.

Thanks Bob. The lead taken by the Washington group could extend to the other class regions where regular luncheon meetings are held. It might seem appropriate also to encourage widows who have a continuing interest in our class to take advantage of socializing and making new friends, including other widows.

In Brunswick, Maine, another major event occurred in August that, historically at least, created national news. I have previously reported that then Colonel Lawrence Joshua Chamberlain's 20th Maine Infantry's valiant defense of Little Round Top was the turning point of the Civil War and for the Union Army during the Battle of Gettysburg on 2 July 1863. When out of ammunition he led his men's bayonet charge against the advancing Confederates to save the Union Army's left flank. President Grover Cleveland awarded him the Congressional Medal of Honor in 1893 for his heroism. In 1896 the ribbon on the original 1862 designed medal was replaced, and in 1904 the medal itself was redesigned and awarded to living winners who in 1907 were allowed also to keep their original medal.

General Chamberlain's original medal disappeared. The estate of the last surviving daughter of Chamberlain was left to the First Parish Church of Duxbury, Massachusetts. A very thoughtful military service veteran purchased a book from the church's estate sale in Duxbury and later discovered the medal in the back of the book. He called the Pejepscot Historical Society in Brunswick, which is celebrating its 125th anniversary this year, to ask if the PHS would like to have him donate it to the PHS for the Joshua Chamberlin House Museum in Brunswick. Shocked, but without hesitation, Executive Director Jennifer Blanchard responded in the affirmative. Upon its receipt a few days later, under secrecy until several institutions and experts analyzed the medal, including the Smithsonian, its authenticity was

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JOSHUA CHAMBERLAIN'S ORIGINAL MEDAL OF HONOR RETURNS HOME TO BRUNSWICK

In early August, Pejepscot Historical Society received one of the most significant gifts of its 125-year history: the original Medal of Honor issued to Joshua Chamberlain in 1893 for his service at Gettysburg in 1863.



As many of you likely know, Bowdoin College has long been home to a Chamberlain Medal of Honor. Theirs is a replacement medal issued in 1904 when the design was changed. Veterans who had previously been awarded medals were allowed to keep their originals in addition to receiving the updated version—hence the two Chamberlain medals.

Pejepscot Historical Society is enormously grateful to the generous friend (who wishes to remain anonymous) who recognized what he had found and believed strongly that it belonged at Chamberlain's home. This is truly a treasure we hadn't dared to hope might one day find its way back to Brunswick.

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Jerry Rapkin sent in the "2013 U.S. Naval History Conference: On Scene Report". The Class of 1952 figured very prominently (of course!). Some excerpts:

"The U.S. Naval Institute's 2013 annual history conference, "Past, Present, and Future of Human Space Flight" at Alumni Hall on the grounds of the U.S. Naval Academy, 3 October 2013, opened with the morning keynote presented by astronaut and retired Lt. Gen. Thomas P. Stafford. ['52].

"Stafford, a veteran of the Gemini and Apollo programs and the Apollo-Soyuz Test Project, opened his remarks by expressing his pleasure at returning to his alma mater. "I'll be talking fast today because there's a lot of history to cover," he said. ... Stafford summarized the subsequent creation of the Mercury program, explaining that the Mercury spacecraft suffered from limitations largely imposed by the limited size of the available launch vehicles. For example, while astronauts were able to change the Mercury spacecraft's attitude, they were not able to affect its vector — a factor that would play a significant role in the design of the subsequent two-person Gemini spacecraft.

"When Yuri Gagarin made mankind's first manned space flight on April 12, 1961, it spurred the United States to respond by launching Alan Shepard on a suborbital flight. President Kennedy made his famous speech before Congress a month later in which he called for a man to be landed on the moon and safely returned to Earth. 'I'm glad he used the words, 'safely returned,' Stafford quipped."

It goes to show you that not all strokes are devastating, and many can be reversed if tended to rapidly. This is what happened. Pat was having lunch with one of her daughters when she noticed she could not pick up her iced tea glass with her right hand. She had suddenly lost her grip. After 3 attempts, she used both hands to lift the glass. Although Pat did not discern any other symptoms of a stroke, her actions was odd and alerted her daughter. They were joined by her other daughter (an MD) on the way to the local hospital. Quick testing indicated she had a stroke, and proper medication was quickly administered. Pat never had any other initial symptoms, and she has made an excellent recovery. She has lingering problems recalling some words (proper nouns) and also recalling some steps in using her computer, and is undergoing speech therapy. Symptoms of a stroke are many and if identified promptly, highly effective medications can be applied in a timely manner. Memorize **FAST** – an acronym for: F-ACE - smile - does one side of the face droop? **A-RMS** – raise both arms – does one arm drift downward? **S-PEECH** – ask the person to repeat a simple phrase - is the speech slurred or strange? **T-IME** – if you observe ANY of these signs call 9 1 1 immediately and get to a hospital. Three hours from onset is the critical time. Other symptoms are sudden numbness or weakness of face, arm, or leg - especially on one side of the body, sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding, sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes, sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination, and sudden severe headache with no known cause. There is quite a lot of stroke information available, and we "Octo's" should be up on it. We can all

The computerized drive-by-wire ship control system improves ship handling in shallow waters. It also features a larger lock-in/lock-out chamber and a reconfigurable torpedo room that can better support Special Operation Forces and their equipment. In addition to delivering Special Forces, the Virginia Class can gather intelligence, perform reconnaissance activities, launch Tomahawk Missiles and conduct the more traditional anti-submarine and antisurface warfare missions. Its reactor plant is designed to last the 33-year life cycle of the ship. This was the Navy's third ship to bear the State of Minnesota name. The first was a sailing steam frigate in 1857, and the second a battleship in 1907. Visitors quickly realized that space was very precious and one legged sailors would have a problem negotiating all those hatches and ladders! Front and center almost immediately after the last News was collected and packaged was **Bill Kronzer** with a hot report and a very cool photo to share:





Resulting blasts and fires ultimately killed 134 men and injured

more than 300. The Navy tried to donate this ship as a memorial or a museum, but no "viable applications" were received. All Star Metals gets the proceeds and a penny but now must pay for moving and dismantling the ship, according to a Navy press release. The company plans to tow the aircraft carrier from its current location at the Navy's inactive ship facility in Philadelphia to its facility in Brownsville, Texas. Named for James Forrestal, the former Navy secretary and the first U.S. Secretary of Defense, the was cited as the "biggest ship ever built" in August 1954,

Lieutenant Colonel Kolbe, Jr. served as a CH-34 helicopter pilot flying MEDEVAC and troop insertion missions in Vietnam in 1966 and 1967 where he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, 27 Air Medals, and the Purple Heart. Lieutenant Colonel Kolbe Jr. was the Commanding Officer of Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 772 (HMH-772) located at Naval Air Station Willow Grove, Pennsylvania when he was killed in an aviation mishap while serving on active duty aboard the USS Guam (LPH-9).

Lieutenant Colonel Kolbe, Jr. is survived by his wife Barbara; daughters, Elizabeth, Susan, and Colonel Kathryn Kolbe, USAF; and son, Lieutenant Colonel Frank P. Kolbe III, USMC (USNA '92)

This is a good time to review, and be proud of, the remarkable accomplishments of the Class of 1963 Foundation. We are grateful for the work of the Foundation trustees and officers in raising, managing, and distributing funds. They have applied their professional abilities and given countless hours of their time over many years. We thank them and salute their dedicated service. I asked the Foundation's fundraising chairman, **Ken Metviner**, to provide a listing of key statistics and grants. Here is his compilation:

■ Our Class Foundation has done some quite commendable things over the 40 years of its existence, all of them thanks to the generosity of our classmates.

The Foundation's scholarship program provided \$848,000 in scholarship assistance to 95 children of deceased classmates. The first three students were enrolled in 1982. The average aid provided was about \$9,000, ranging from a low of \$650 to one student to a high of \$33,890 to another with special needs. The program began with assistance of \$1,000 per year in 1982 and finished over the last several years with assistance at \$16,000/year. One student is in the program at this time.

The Foundation distributed another \$175,000 to a variety of programs and causes. These grants included:

- \$50,000 to USNA at our 30th Reunion
- \$37,500 for the Levy Chapel and Center
 - \$25,000 for a Memorial Chapel Pew
- \$5,000 for Commissioning of the USS FITZGERALD
- \$6,000 for the Submarine Memorial at USNA
- \$2,500 for the U.S. Navy Memorial in Washington DC
- \$3,000 for the USS LIBERTY Memorial
- \$3,500 for endowment of flowers for the Chapel on Parent's Weekend

In addition, funds were provided for selected aid to widows, Another Link in The Chain program, the search for the Bon Homme Richard, and various memorial services over the years.

In sum, we raised and distributed over \$1 million in memory of our deceased classmates and still have a corpus of well over \$600,000 which will be added to the Legacy Gift for funding our namesake

Class of 1963 Center for Academic Excellence (63CAE).

All in all, a true "BZ" for 1963!! ■

A day before the reunion began, our classmates who were members of Navy's crew team assembled for a ceremony at Hubbard Hall. Here is a brief excerpt from the news story in the Navy Crew Newsletter:

On October 23rd, alumni, midshipmen and coaches gathered to celebrate the Class of 1963's 50th reunion with a shell dedication.

The program recognized the Class of 1963 by naming a lightweight shell in their honor on their 50th USNA reunion. The Class of 1963 is one of our most supportive alumni groups. They helped to provide Navy's heavyweight, lightweight and women's crews with the best equipment available. Their collaborative effort is the basis of our Navy Crew Excellence Fund, from which the majority of our rowing shells are now bought. They have also started a 1963 shell endowment fund which will keep a "Class of 1963" shell in our boathouse forever.

The article recounts the remarkable accomplishments of 1963 oarsmen and coxswains during their Midshipman years and afterward and refers to our Plebe boat as "legendary." To see the full, illustrated story, visit the 50th Reunion section of our web site.

In mid-November, **Phillip Marsden** sent this very good news about **Vern Von Sydow**:

■ Classmates, it is an honor for me to pass on the news that Vern Von Sydow has been honored by the AARP Educator Community for his continued service in the San Diego community to help at-risk youths. He was one of only three individuals so recognized this year. Vern's selfless efforts on behalf of these youths have gone on for many years and truly represent a sterling example of the highest ideals of public service. I am proud to be his classmate and consider him to be one of our Class's "Distinguished Graduates".

Here is a description of the award, followed by the text honoring Vern.

AARP's Educator Community is committed to learning, voluntary service and civic participation. The recipients of NRTA's 14th Annual With Our Youth! awards were chosen for outstanding service to youth in the state, local, individual and impact categories by an independent selection panel.

Vern Von Sydow has touched the lives of literally thousands of at-risk high school students. His math tutoring has helped turn dropouts into college students, and teachers credit working one on one with him as one of the key interventions to move students ahead. Years ago, he reached out to his Naval Academy class alumni network and asked for donations to start the Palomar Scholarship Foundation, which awards more than 20 scholarships per year to deserving young people. That seed money along with fundraising and donations has supported young people going to college for over 20 years.

He is a role model to all teachers for his selflessness in retiring to save the jobs of younger teachers and in his work ethic. Despite being retired, he still comes to school every day to tutor at-risk kids in math. In particular he works with teen mothers to help them achieve their graduation goals. He comes in early and stays late yet always has time to devote to a student who needs him whether it be to teach them how to tie a tie for a job interview or just to listen to them when they are feeling down. He never fails to remind that mistakes are just another step in the direction of perfection.

The scholarship fund is a fully functioning 501(c)(3) charity registered with the state of California, and he serves as the foundation's president. He is also on the Sweetwater Union School District's Superintendent's Advisory Committee helping to shape new education policy. During his teaching years, he established an internship program where at-risk teens work in jobs on the local naval base learning career skills and building relationships with naval mentors. The Navy Internship Training Program has served thousands of young men and women and has been recognized with a Golden Bell award from the governor of California.

Any member of our Association (as defined in the Constitution and Bylaws) may volunteer for the office or submit a nomination to our Nominating Committee. All submittals will receive consideration for the slate of candidates, which will be limited to no more than three candidates.

Following is a timeline for the Nominating Committee:

- Notify Class of forthcoming election: January 2014
- Identify willing & capable candidates:
 April 2014
- Submit communications from candidate(s): June 2014
- Set up online voting process: August 2014
- Announce results of election: September 2014
- New President relieves the watch: January 1, 2015

Candidates should be qualified to:
1. Provide leadership for the Board of Directors and preside over Board and Class Association meetings, although it is clear from the Bylaws that "the Board shall have full authority to govern the Association." The President should be comfortable with shaping a consensus among fellow classmates who are volunteers.

- 2. Staff the Board of Directors to meet the challenges of a new era. The Class will no longer be conducting major fundraising efforts; the impact of aging on our membership will become more pronounced; classmates will travel less frequently and our fellow alumni from the 60's are no longer active in the yard.
- 3. Manage constant vigilance and continuing improvement of our communications so that Class-wide programs and especially 64 CARES can continue to be successful.

Pertinent excerpts from the Constitution and Bylaws:

Article IV Section 3a The President shall be elected during the year of a five-year reunion by a vote of the Association membership for a term of five years or until his successor is elected, with such term commencing January 1 of the year following the election, or if the election is later than January 1 then the date of his election.

Article IV Section 3b Nominations for President shall be made by a nominating committee. The incumbent President shall appoint the chairman of the nominating committee from among the membership of the Association, and the chairman shall then appoint at least two other committee members to serve with him, at least one of whom shall not be a member of the Board. The nominating committee shall consider all members of the Association who volunteer to seek election.

Article IV Section 3d Candidates shall be listed on the ballot in alphabetical order of last names, and a space shall be provided for a write-in candidate. A plurality of votes cast shall elect, and the total number of votes cast for each candidate will be posted on the Class web site following the election.

Bob had left Nuclear Power School suddenly in 1968, but information was sparse after that until his death on 21 January 2000 in Reston,VA of a brain tumor. This past October, I received a wonderful e-mail from Rima Szalay Granados (wife of

Gene Granados '90). Rima is Bob's daughter, and she wanted to know if I could share any memories of her dad at USNA. No, I could not, but I forwarded her request to Classmates who might remember him. The response was phenomenal! Thanks to Classmates from 2nd Company and from the basketball team for getting in touch with Rima and giving her your recollections of Bob. I also asked Rima if she could fill in some blanks for us. She graciously agreed and sent this:

■ I have heard from many of you following my request for stories about my dad. Reading your memories about him gave him back to me for those few minutes. It was a delight. I hear that many lost touch with him right before sub school until the 25th reunion, then lost touch again. Here is a summary of my dad's life following the Academy.

He married Carole Stone the week of your graduation. I was born in September of 1968, and my father felt he needed to personally take care of us and leave the Navy when an urgent medical situation arose. Dad took a job as a nuclear engineer in NY and soon after, moved down to Washington, DC. Three Mile Island brought nuclear power to the fore in 1979, and my dad was chosen as the pronuke public face to explain the accident from the industry's point of view. He was on McNeil Lehrer and was invited to many fancy events. I remember thinking that all dads attended dances at the White House.

After his divorce from my mom, he remarried to Linda Dobrin in 1982. (For those who knew Carole, she has remarried and lives near Ashville, NC...jm67) In 1983, he sat me down and explained with great poise that he had only 2 months to live. NIH found his glioblastoma interesting and took him on as part of an experimental case study. Out of his group at NIH, only he survived...and survived. He lived another 16 years.

His pride in the Naval Academy and surviving that ordeal to become stronger and more focused was the basis of many stories throughout my childhood. In 1988, Linda and my dad had a son, Jamey, who would make my father very proud. He is a doctoral student in physics and already working with NASA. Linda and my father divorced soon afterward.

In 1992. Dad asked me to attend his 25th Academy Reunion with him, where I am sure we spoke with many of you. I remember one of you came up to me with a big smile and said, "Carole, you haven't changed a bit!" Dad was so proud to see all of you again, yet so nervous that you would notice the wig he wore to hide his brain biopsy. As the years went on, he lost more and more function. The neurologists told us that a tumor as big as his had to have started growing when he was about 19. He passed away in 2000 at age 54. Thank you, all of you, for being so kind to my dad during your years together. He never forgot you, and memories of you brought him joy for the rest of his life.



Bob and I rowed lightweight crew for a while and Lynne graduated from my arch-rival high school in upstate NY. Both of us have camps on two of the Finger Lakes there (Otisco and Cayuga Lakes). Doug & Char were so connected with a few of us in Club 34 that they've become honorary members.

I asked Tim what he has been doing and received back the following.

"Life for Carol and me took an interesting turn at the end of 2012. After nearly ten years at the helm of the Duke Farms Foundation in Hillsborough, NJ, we moved to Cayuga Lake in Central New York State, where we'd purchased a 69 acre, lakeside farm in 2006. It's known as wine country up here, but it's also resplendent with large tillable farmland and forests amid the Finger Lakes. Over the years, we've spent our weekends travelling between the two places renovating a 1840 farmhouse, barns, and a lakeside cottage.

The intent of moving has been to develop a non-profit "incubator" for organic farming targeted on veterans (and immediate family) of the Global War on Terrorism who've suffered amputation, traumatic brain injury, and post-traumatic stress disorders. As an incubator, the concept is that the family would be housed on-site, provided adjacent land (1/2 - 5 acres), farm equipment and accessories, utilities, etc. for one to three years at a minimal cost (currently ~30% of their monthly disability/retirement pay). The rest of the costs – both capital and expenses – would be covered by the non-profit entity. During incubation they'd be working on producing fruits, fungus (think of mushrooms),

vegetables, fish, poultry, or any form of livestock, while completing a business plan to lease or buy their own farm somewhere in the Finger Lakes region or beyond. The non-profit would also assist in all of that. Educational programs on organic farming and management have already been set up with Cornell and Syracuse Universities and the Northeast Organic Farming Association. Recreational opportunities are unparalleled with every known native fish in the 39 mile-long Cayuga Lake (including record brook, brown, rainbow and lake trout) and thousands of acres of Virginia white-tailed deer and quail. At least six housing units would be built.

I developed such an incubator at Duke Farms as part of a five-tiered approach toward organic farming. Although Doris Duke, considered the wealthiest woman in the world at the time of her death in 1993. left clues as to how she wanted her 2,740 acre estate used after her death, when I arrived in 2003 after retiring from the Navy Reserve and unwinding from business, her Trustees still hadn't decided on the strategic direction of the property. I argued for a total transformation of what was being done, was provided with \$ 50 million for capital renovations, and in May 2012 we opened as the most ecologically sustainable and environmentally conservational property in NI and a regional learning center for those topics. I was just notified that two of our buildings, a 23,000 square foot 100 year old stone barn, and 110 year old glass conservatory were awarded Platinum level under the LEED rating program by the US Green Building Council (LEED is Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design). My biggest challenge now – and where classmates can potentially help – is to get before groups of disabled vets to pitch my concept and get their feedback. It's the last step I need to complete the non-profit business plan. I've tried getting sessions at Walter Reed NMMC, the VA, and the Wounded Warrior Project but have been rebuffed due to their sense of legal protocols. Anyone know how to break the log jams, then please let me know at tayt.taylor@gmail.com"

Tim, Thanks again and Good luck.







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
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On Wednesday **September 11**, the Oregon and Southwest Washington Chapter met for our monthly meeting at Portland's Old Spaghetti Factory.

Our speaker was Ponda Bethke, an employee of the Electric Reliability Corporation of Texas, (ERCOT), which controls the flow of electricity in the state. Ponda is a volunteer with Honor Flight Austin. The group is dedicated to identifying World War II veterans in Central Texas, and providing them a free trip to Washington, D.C., to see the World War II memorial.

A memorial honoring The Greatest Generation wasn't completed until 2004, decades after those for other wars. A year later Earl Morris, a retired Air Force officer, working in a clinic in Ohio, realized that his WWII veteran patients who had expressed an interest in going to see "their" memorial were finding it financially and physically impossible to do so.

Forming a group of small plane pilots, he began taking veterans to Washington. But it soon became obvious that small planes would never be able to handle the numbers of veterans who were there, Ms. Bethke said. In addition, it started becoming obvious that WWII veterans were dying at a rate of hundreds a day.

They group began the fund-raising operation in cooperation with airlines that made it possible to take larger numbers of veterans.

Ms. Bethke said the Austin Chapter of Honor Flight came into being in 2012. Flights originating from Austin take place in spring, early summer, fall and early winter,

pausing during the most severe weather times in Washington. Funds raised by the organization pay all the costs of the veterans who make the trip in groups of 34 or 35.

Volunteers, known as Guardians, meet the veterans as they arrive at the curb at the Austin airport, she said. Each veteran is asked to sit in a wheel chair in which they will make the trip through the airport and around D.C. That makes it possible for the veterans to move as a group, she said, although many of the veterans don't need the assistance.

They are assisted through security at the airport, then lined up in the inner concourse. Led by a Transportation Security Agency color guard and a bagpipe and drum from the Austin Police Department, they parade through the airport.

Ms. Bethke said people come out of the gate areas, the restaurants and the shops to applaud the veterans as they proceed to their gate.

After a ceremony at the gate and a box lunch donated by a local company, they board their Southwest Airlines plane for the trip to Washington, accompanied by a few Guardians. Other Guardians, many of them active duty military personnel, meet the veterans as they arrive at Ronald Reagan Airport, and stay with their assigned individual for the entire tour.

They have dinner and spend the night at a Washington hotel, and enter buses for the trip around the district. First stop is the WWII memorial, followed by visits to the Vietnam and Korean memorials, Iwo Jima and Air Force memorials, and finally a stop at Arlington National Cemetery for the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown. Groups often are able to participate in placing a wreath at the tomb.

Following the long day, they board a flight home, during which they are given a package of letters from family members and others thanking them for their service.

Their Austin Guardians meet them at the gate, she said, and take them to the outer lobby, where an NJROTC honor guard, and a cheering crowd of family members and other observers wait for them. After a final ceremony and some gifts, their Guardians see that they get back to cars or buses which are waiting.

The Chapter won't meet in December as we get together with the Austin West Point Chapter for the annual Navy victory.

Captain Daniel Moran, USMC (Ret.), Texas A&M University '03 graduate, spoke about his Marine Corps experiences during his initial tour of duty in Fallujah, Iraq in 2005; and then his deployment to Ramadi, Iraq in Sept 2006.

Dan was wounded during a patrol on Oct 9, 2006 north of the city of Ramadi. Twelve days later, Dan's vehicle was hit by an IED, killing three of his Marines and severely injuring him and his vehicle commander. Dan sustained 3rd degree burns to 50% of his body, incurred multiple fractures in his back, suffered an inhalation injury, a concussion and loss of his spleen. He was transferred to Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, where he recovered for almost 3 years.

Dan founded Moran Enterprises Inc on Nov 10, 2008 and serves as Chmn & Pres. He medically retired as a Captain of Marines on July 31, 2009.

Dan was awarded the Navy Commendation Medal with Valor, which was presented to him by former President George H.W. Bush and Secretary of Defense Robert M. Gates during half time of the Texas A&M vs. University of Kansas football game in College Station on Oct 27, 2007.

John O'Neill '67 later remarked that "two bookends for me are my close friend Joe Reynolds (one of only 4 surviving Marines in the first wave on Iwo Jima AND in the Northern part of the Frozen Chosin) who spoke to our Chapter 6 years ago (missing fingers shot off at Iwo and removed frost-bitten toes)—now gone—and now Dan Moran. I kept thinking Joe is so proud to know that those Marines are still his people in Soul and Heart. Joe is certainly guarding the streets of Heaven." Google "Joe H. Reynolds Marine" for more info.

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Admiral Kinnaird R. McKee '51, USN (Ret.) 14 August 1929–30 December 2013

"So when a great man dies For years beyond our ken The light he leaves behind him lies Upon the paths of men."

Following his graduation from the United States Naval Academy, Admiral Kinnaird McKee '51, USN (Ret.), served in PICUDA, SEA CAT and MARLIN before taking command of the Navy's only experimental midget submarine, X-1, and leading the small submarine's first dive. After tours as executive officer on board NAUTILUS and SAM HOUSTON, McKee served in the Naval Reactors Division of the Atomic Energy Commission from 1964 to 1966 and took command of the nuclear-powered attack submarine DACE from 1966 to 1969. McKee led the ship to two Navy Unit Commendation awards and two Battle Efficiency pennants.

Following command of DACE, he was ordered back to Washington to serve in the office of the director, Navy Program Planning. In 1970, McKee was assigned to the immediate staff of the Chief of Naval Operations where he established the Chief of Naval Operations Executive Panel and served as its first director. From 1973 to 1975, McKee commanded Submarine Group 8 and NATO's submarine forces in the Mediterranean, adapting new tactics for submarines and support battle groups.

McKee became the 48th Superintendent of the United States Naval Academy in July 1975 and assisted in achieving Brigade and service acceptance of the admittance of women to the service academies during his tour.

After being promoted to three-star rank in March 1987 and serving as Commander, U.S. Third Fleet, McKee returned to Washington to serve as the first director of Naval Warfare. On 1 February 1982, McKee was nominated and approved by Congress to become Director, Naval Nuclear Propulsion following the retirement of Admiral Hyman Rickover '22, USN (Ret.). On 2 March 1982, McKee was confirmed by the U.S. Senate for promotion to four-star rank.

Awarded two Distinguished Service Medals and five Legions of Merit, McKee was routinely selected for the Navy's toughest assignments. Following his retirement in 1988, McKee remained active in the field of education and nuclear power. In 2006, the Naval Academy Alumni

Association awarded Admiral McKee the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association Distinguished Graduate Award, in recognition of his contributions to the nation, Navy and Naval Academy.

Commander Kenneth B. Hysong, USN (Ret.), died on 30 November 2013 at his residence. He was 97 years old.

CLIFFORD ALTON LENZ '41

Commander Clifford Lenz, USN (Ret.), 94, passed away peacefully on 28 September 2013, surrounded by family. He had been residing in Seattle for several years to be near his children as he coped with dementia.

"Cliff" was born in Latrobe, PA, in 1919, the youngest of 11 children. Athletically gifted, he entered high school at age 13 with the size, speed and talent to be the starting fullback on the varsity

football team as a freshman. He held his high school discus record for many years. He received a congressional appointment to the Naval Academy after fielding offers to play football from Notre Dame, Duke and Pitt.

At the Academy, he excelled on the gridiron and was selected to both the Walter Camp and Grantland Rice All-American teams. He was also the Academy heavyweight boxing champion and the outstanding athlete of the Naval Academy Class of 1941.

Upon graduation, he served as damage control officer on ENTERPRISE in the Pacific. Fortunately, ENTERPRISE (scheduled to be in Pearl Harbor on 6 December 1941) was held outside the islands because of stormy weather. He was to be officer of the deck on the morning of December 7th, had they been in port.

He participated in several of the legendary Pacific battles: Coral Sea, the Doolittle Raid on Tokyo, Midway and the Battle of the Eastern Solomons and Guadalcanal (where he earned a Purple Heart).

He met June Lipke in Honolulu, and they were married in 1943 when he returned to Pensacola for pilot training. He earned his Wings and was about to return to the Pacific when the war ended.

Post WWII, he was on the staff of the Joint Chiefs. He commanded a seaplane squadron in Trinidad, and later returned to the Academy to teach aviation.

The mid-1950s found him on the aircraft carrier HORNET as navigator, and later became XO of the Amphibious Base Training Schools in Coronado.

Retiring from the Navy in 1963, he and June started one of Coronado's most successful gift stores, The Bayberry Tree. They traveled the world harvesting unique artwork and gift items.

June passed away in 2008 after 65 years of marriage. Theirs was an abiding love story of lives well-lived, filled with deep and enduring friendships.

Cliff is survived by his son, Cliff Jr.; daughter, Shannon; grandsons, Connor and Darren; and great-grandchildren, Kylah and R eeve

On 1 November 2013, he was buried with military honors at Ft. Rosecrans Cemetery.



ERNST HOEFER JR. '42

Ernst Hoefer Jr. died on 20 September 2013 in Kalamazoo, MI. He was 91 years old.

Ernst was born to Ernst and Jezznette Hoefer on 15 November 1921 in Sheboygan, WI, where he attended public schools. After a year at Harvard University at age 16, Ernst obtained an appointment to the Naval Academy, graduating on 19 December 1941 with the accelerated Class of 1942.

Ernst's assignment upon graduation was to Pennsylvania (BB-38). After repair for damage at Pearl Harbor on 7 December 1941, Pennsylvania conducted shore bombardment during the Aleutian Campaign. Ernst volunteered for flight training, first training in Texas. Ernst then served as a naval aviator. Ernst's most prominent assignment in aviation was as CO of a typhoon reconnaissance squadron during formation and operational training. While on active duty, Ernst studied at Rhode Island University (1951–1952) and The George Washington University (1953).

Ernst resigned from the Navy 31 October 1955 as a lieutenant commander and entered private business. Ernst worked as an engineer, manager and consultant. He worked in Italy and countries in the Mediterranean for over 20 years, including some work with the U.S. Embassy in Rome. Ernst met and married his wife, Roseanna, in Italy.

Ernst retired in the 1980s and he and his wife settled in Kalamazoo, MI. Roseanna died in 2002 and Ernst lived in Kalamazoo until his death.

He is survived by his brother, Bruce Hoefer '47; Bruce's wife, Matilda; and several nieces and nephews.

Ernst's ashes will be interred in the family plot in the cemetery in Sheboygan, WI, at a later date.

Captain Edgar E. Mallick, USN (Ret.), passed away in Sarasota, FL, on 13 October 2013 following a brief illness. He was 93 years old.

"Ed" graduated with the USNA Class of 1944, graduating in June 1943 because of the accelerated World War II training programs. He was assigned to the battleship ARKANSAS (BB-33) and participated in

Subsequent duty assignments included VH-1 in Saipan; VP-27 Kaneohe, HI; BuAir, Washington, DC; Fleet Air, Atsugi, Japan; Instructor, USNA; BuWeps, Washington, DC; XO VP-46, Coronado; XO Fleet Air Wing 6, Iwakuni, Japan and liaison officer to the Japanese Maritime Self Defense Forces; Office of Naval Materiel, Washington, DC; Mathematics Department Head, USNA; and Assistant Dean for Faculty Affairs, USNA, until his Navy retirement in June 1970.

His service decorations include the American Defense Service Medal (one Bronze Star); American Campaign Medal; European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal (three Stars); World War II Victory Medal; Combat Action Ribbon; National Defense Service Medal Second Award; Korean Service Medal; and the United Nations Service Medal.

Following his Navy retirement, Ed was academic dean for three years at the College of Mt. Saint Joseph in Cincinnati, OH. Later, he returned to Annapolis as manager of the Merrill Lynch office for ten years until 1986. In his second retirement, he and Sue travelled extensively on six continents, and also completed an around-the-world semester-at-sea program run by the University of Pittsburgh aboard UNIVERSE. In 1995, Ed and Sue moved to their retirement home on Longboat, Key, FL, and to Sarasota's Glenridge Retirement Community in 2005.

Ed was predeceased by his beloved wife of 67 years, Sue (nee Higgins). He is survived by his brother, Earl W. Mallick of Ft. Myers, FL; three children, Kathryn Nissly (Barry) of Lancaster, PA, Susan Stevenson (Chuck) of Orlando, FL; and Dr. Edgar E. Mallick Jr. (Darlene) of Annapolis, MD; eight grandchildren, Heidi, Tammy, Kristen, Polly, Emily, Karen, Ted and Becky; 12 great–grandchildren; and his exchange student daughters, Michelle Saada of Paris, France, and Ola "Cleo" Shousha of Cairo, Egypt.

A memorial service with full military honors was conducted at the Naval Academy Chapel on 18 November 2013, followed by inurnment at the Naval Academy Columbarium.

EDWARD HAMILTON DOOLIN JR. '45

Captain "Ted" Doolin, USN (Ret.), died peacefully in his sleep on 30 September 2013, after a long illness in the Fairfax Retirement Community (Fort Belvoir,VA).

Ted was born into a Navy family and mostly grew up in Annapolis, MD. His great-grandfather, William H. Willcox, was USNA graduate number 60 in 1847, and his father was Edward H. Doolin '20. Ted graduated from Point Loma High

School in San Diego (where, unbeknownst to him, the future Mrs. Doolin was an undergraduate) and attended a year at Cochrane Bryan Prep School in Annapolis prior to entering the Academy on a congressional appointment in 1941.

Due to war-accelerated requirements, he graduated in 1944 and reported to LOUISVILLE in the Western Pacific. He participated in numerous battles around the Philippines, including the resounding victory over a Japanese battleship fleet in the Surigao

Straights during the Battle of Leyte Gulf in October 1944. After surviving a double kamikaze attack, he participated in the Okinawa campaign and survived another kamikaze hit.

In September 1945, he returned to California to marry Mary M. MacKerracher, daughter of Captain Robert MacKerracher '23. "Polly" had frequently followed her father during his Pacific deployments and was familiar with the rigors of Navy life. Her poise and sparkling personality were key factors in Ted's successes.

After attending Flight School, Ted received his Navy Wings in May 1947. Subsequent assignments included patrol, heavy attack and Test Pilot School at Pax River (as one of the first graduates). He transitioned to fighters in 1959 and was assigned as executive officer of VF-103 and CO of VF-33. Following a tour as air boss on INTREPID, Ted was the director of Weapons Systems Test Division at NAS Pax River, MD. Ted then transferred to the Pacific as CO of MAGOFFIN (APA-199) in support of operations off South Vietnam in 1967. He retired from the Navy following a tour as the OinC of NavAir's Weapons Systems Analysis Office in 1970. Ted was awarded a MA from American University and completed a second career as a senior systems analyst with Planning Research Corporation.

Ted is survived by his wife, Polly; children, Ted III '68, Mike '70, James '74 and Tory; as well as six grandchildren, Richard '99, Rachel, Michelle, Danielle, Herb and Tom.

RAYMOND BERTCHALL OLIVER '45

Raymond B. Oliver died on 25 February 2012 in Towson, MD. He was 90 years old. He was a beloved teacher, coach and mentor for 45 years to countless students.

"Ray" was born in Baltimore, MD, where he attended McDonogh School as a scholarship student. In 1940, he received an appointment to the Naval Academy and graduated in 1944. As an ensign, he was immediately assigned to

the Pacific as a gunnery officer aboard the battleship TEXAS, which was attacked by kamikaze bombers. He recalled providing gunfire support during the Battle of Iwo Jima and seeing Marines raise the American flag atop Mount Suribachi.

In 1947, he returned to Baltimore and returned to his high school to become a mathematics teacher. That year he also met his future wife, Evelyn Dorothy Funk. To quote McDonogh School's retired dean of faculty who knew Ray for decades, "Ray Oliver was the quintessential teacher and coach. He was insistent, demanding, clear-headed, precise, goal-oriented and competitive. He was unassuming, compassionate, and infinitely fair and dedicated to reaching out to the kid in trouble." Ray Oliver, or Mr. O, or Coach O, was a mentor to many a McDonogh wrestler. Said a former student, "he loved the sport of wrestling and appreciated what it could do to build character and make men out of boys. He was more concerned with making his wrestlers good students and good citizens than he was about wins and losses." Friends said he anonymously paid for wrestling camp for students who could not afford the expense. In 2001, he was elected to the Maryland Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame. Ray carefully encouraged and prepared numerous McDonogh students as they prepared their journey to the Naval Academy.

Ray's beloved wife of 63 years, Evelyn, died in 2011. He is survived by his son, Craig Oliver; daughter, Victoria Wineke; and grandchildren.

CHARLES EDWARD CAUFFMAN '51

Lieutenant Commander "Bear" Cauffman, USN (Ret.), died on 14 October 2013 of prostate cancer.

Bear was born in Whittier, CA, on 11 August 1927 and began his military career in 1944 in the Army. He was discharged from the Army in 1945, re-enlisted in the Navy, and was admitted to the Naval Academy in 1947. Bear took up varsity pistol in 1950 after a severe foot-

Later, Bear served as catapult officer on YORKTOWN (CV-10). From 1962 through 1964, Bear served VF-24 as executive officer aboard MIDWAY (CVA-41). In 1964, Bear served as the aerospace operations branch head at the Navy Missile Center, Point Mugu. In 1967, Bear served as the VC-5 executive officer, and later, as acting commanding officer of the main squadron in Atsugi and its detachments in Okinawa, the Philippines and Vietnam. In 1968, Bear was ordered back to the Naval Missile Center as security officer, assigned to set up, produce and supervise the first Navy in Space Fair at the Naval Missile Center, drawing more than one million visitors. He retired in 1970 with 26 years total service.

After retirement, Bear volunteered at the YMCA as director of youth activities. In 1975, he volunteered with the Boy Scouts serving as commissioner and scoutmaster of Troop 257. In 1987, he relocated to Paso Robles, CA, where he volunteered as a reserve sheriff officer. In 2004, Bear suffered a stroke outside and was found several days later. He suffered significant loss of independence and moved in with his son. In 2013, Bear was diagnosed with stage IV prostate cancer and died a few months later.

He is survived by his only child, Christopher.

After a private service, he was cremated. His ashes will be spread over the Sierra Mountains.

FRANK ANTONIO LIBERATO '51

Captain Frank A. Liberato, USNR (Ret.), died on 3 October 2013 at home from complications arising out of COPD.

He was born on 17 June 1928 in Pensacola, FL, where he developed a life long love for naval aviation. Frank known to his many friends and classmates as "Fang" for his quick strike wit and repartee—was well-known and liked for his sense of humor, ready smile

The highlight of Fang's flight training was being keel-hauled under his old ship, MONTEREY, when he ditched an F6F Hellcat after engine failure on launch. Fang received his Wings of Gold in 1953 and went to advanced flight training in jet aircraft. After two Mediterranean deployments, Fang returned to Pensacola as a jet instructor. Following this, he served on the Chief of Naval Air Training staff as the assistant aviation safety officer and continued qualifying in next generation jets. Then it was back to Jacksonville for duty with VFP-62. During the Cuban Missile Crisis, he took the reconnaissance photographs of Soviet missiles that were shown to President Kennedy and the National Command authorities as evidence of Soviet aggression.

Fang retired in 1977 after serving on nine different aircraft carriers and qualifying in 26 Navy aircraft. 

STEPHEN FRANCIS MURPHY '91 Captain Steve Murphy, USN, died on 4 November 2013 on active duty following a more than two-year battle with cancer.

He was 44 years old.

"Murph" grew up in Catonsville, MD, and graduated from Catonsville High School. He received a congressional appointment to the Naval Academy, where he was a Trident Scholar and member of the varsity offshore sail-

ing team. A political science major, he graduated with distinction in the Class of 1991 as a member of 19th Company.

A career Surface Warfare Officer, Steve's afloat assignments included navigator, first lieutenant and electrical officer in VALLEY FORGE (CG-50), operations officer in GONZALEZ (DDG-66), operations officer in Destroyer Squadron Two Eight (CDS-28), executive officer in NORMANDY (CG-60) and commanding officer in MAHAN (DDG-72), homeported in Norfolk, VA. Following his first sea tour, Steve was selected as an Olmsted Scholar to Kyiv, Ukraine, where he earned a master's degree in international relations from Taras Schevchenko State University. Ashore, Steve served in a variety of demanding, high-visibility staff assignments including deputy executive assistant to the Commander, Allied Joint Force Command Naples, Italy, deputy executive assistant to the Vice Chief of Naval Operations, and special assistant to the Chief of Naval Operations. Based on his superb performance throughout his career, Steve was selected for Major Command afloat. In June 2013, while undergoing cancer treatment, he completed a master's degree in national security strategy from the National War College and was awarded the Colonel Richard Christie Marine Corps Association's Award for Excellence in Writing.

Steve was an exceptional naval officer; however, his greatest joy was family. He is survived by his wife of 18 years, Carrie; their 12-year-old daughter, Madeleine, whom he cherished; his parents, Charles and Angela Murphy; and siblings, Diane Warner, Mary Rutter, Charles Murphy Jr., Elizabeth Flerlage, Paul Murphy and John Murphy—all of whom intensely supported Steve throughout this fight.

Steve was a man of great integrity, courage, humility and deep faith. He was known for his compassionate leadership style and easygoing demeanor that had a way of inspiring and lifting those around him. An active member of his church and community, Steve also enjoyed cycling and triathlons. A true Sailor, shipmate and friend—he is sorely missed.

His memorial service with military honors was held at the Naval Academy Chapel on 13 December. He will be interred at the Naval Academy Columbarium in a private ceremony.
