Adams (DDG-2). He then transitioned from surface ships to submarines and attended Sub School in New London, CT. Following Sub School, he served on the USS Harder (SS-568), Charleston, SC; the Naval Intelligence Staff, Pearl Harbor, HI; USS Odax (SS-484), San Diego, CA; USS Sea Fox (SS-402), San Diego, CA; He then returned to surface ships and attended Destroyer School in Newport, RI. Following Destroyer School, he served on the USS Fox (DLG-33), San Diego, CA; USS Towers (DDG-33), San Diego, CA; the Naval Surface Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet (SURFPAC) Staff, San Diego, CA; Commanding Officer USS Waddell (DDG-24), San Diego, CA; National War College, Washington, DC; and the Aegis Program Office, Pentagon, Arlington, VA. Bill was awarded the Navy and Marine Corp Commendation Medal, the SURFPAC Ship Handling Award, the Meritorious Service Medal and the Legion of Merit Medal. Bill retired from the Navy in November 1986 as a Captain (0-6), having served his country for 26 years.
