ABOUT TODAY'S SERVICE

The Divine Service in which we share this morning is one that has evolved gradually since the establishment of the Naval Academy in 1845. Many of the liturgical elements of the service are quite familiar to all Protestant Churches, while others are unique to the Academy Chapel. The Prayer for the Naval Academy was introduced by Chaplain H. H. Clark, Senior Chaplain, 1896-1911. The Prayer for Midshipmen was written by Chaplain W. N. Thomas, Senior Chaplain, 1933-1945. The tradition of including the Navy Hymn ("Eternal Father Strong to Save . . .") in the Order of Worship began in 1879 with Lieutenant Commander C. J. Train, USN, who at that time directed the Midshipmen's Choir. An interesting part of our worship is the dipping of our country's Colors before the Altar. In similar manner the Church Pennant is flown above the National Ensign when Divine Services are held at sea. These acts are symbolic of the priority of allegiance we all owe to Almighty God-the one and only power to whom our nation is subject.

As the 1145 Protestant Divine Service follows closely upon the conclusion of the Baccalaureate Service may we ask that the congregation exit by all available doors.

ORGAN RECITAL

This afternoon at 1500 there will be a demonstration of the Chapel pipe organ by Chapel Organist James Dale. Following a brief description of the organ and its history, Mr. Dale will present a "Pops" concert featuring works by Bach, Vierne, Debussy, Lemare, and Tchaikovsky.
